President's Report M. P. B. Annual Meeting

Following is the report of President C. C. Gillespie:

In presenting the President's Report of the Maritime Branch I have pleasure in stating that in spite of many difficulties encountered, the Branch has made some headway in the interests of amateurism throughout the year.

We have as usual a large number of athletic associations at present affiliated with the Branch, I think a slight increase over the previous year. We have been called upon to issue a great many sanctions to conduct athletic meets throughout the year and I am very pleased to say from the information I have received from our Secretary that in most all cases the Association in this section have applied for their sanctions in the proper way. The total number of amateur cards issued I understand to be about the same as last year.

REGISTRATION

The work of our Registration Committee has been very light during the past year, there being very few infringements of amateur laws reported to the various members of the registration Committee. Some have been dealt with and have been forwarded to the National registration Committee with a favorable recommendation.

BOXING

I am pleased to say that from the applications received for sanctions that the boxing in the Maritimes has not suffered from the inroads of professional promoters and the results for the Championships are very gratifying to all.

BASKETBALL

The Basketball section of the Branch has been very active throughout the year and under the guiding hand of the National Basketball Association and their Maritime Branches have been going along very well.

BASEBALL

We have had considerable trouble during the past few years in connection with baseball playoffs and I should appreciate very much if all present at the meeting today would consider this matter very carefully so that we may erect a set of regulations which will in future govern the play downs in the Maritimes after they have been completed by the Baseball Associations in the different provinces. I wish to congratulate the baseball associations for the splendid work they are at present doing and can say that when the new regulations are in force we may expect to get through our play downs with less disputing, etc.

HOCKEY

The Maritime Hockey Association is continuing under Mr. Schryer and Mr. White of Bathurst, and I am sure we can receive their utmost support and co-operation throughout the winter and that they will receive ours. I may say that the Secretary and myself attended the annual meeting of the Hockey Association in Halifax and again brought up the question of monies due the M. P. B. of A. A. U. of Canada and after a check up was made of the financial standing of the Association it was agreed that nothing could be paid the branch at present.

TRACK AND FIELD

The interest in track and field has increased rather than diminished during the past year and the performance of our athletes under the jurisdiction has been above the standard of other years. A great many meets took place throughout the provinces for which sanctions were issued and I wish to pay an especial tribute to those associations in the Provinces who are endeavoring to assist track and field. The Maritime Championships took place in Halifax this year and while it was not a financial success it was otherwise and I am very pleased to say that from the competitors who took part your selection committee selected five athletes and a coach to represent the Maritimes at the Canadian Championships in Toronto. The expense of one athlete was looked after by Acadia College and the Branch stood the expense of the remainder. Their showing at the Maritime and Canadian championships as well as at the British Empire Games I think justifies our sending them and I am sure all were proud of their showing and that our money was well spent. To those looking after the Inter Collegiate and Interscholastic Track and Field let me congratulate on the splendid showing and their records are well worth looking over, and I wish to express the gratitude of the Branch for their efforts.

Former Island Priest Tendered Civic Banquet

More than 500 friends and well-wishers of Reverend Father Thomas H. Trainor, Rector of Saint Joseph's Church, attended the civic banquet held Sunday night in the Nickel Range Hotel in honor of his 25th anniversary in the priesthood. So large was the crowd that it could not all be accommodated in the ballroom, the main banquet hall, and a hundred or more were served on the mezzanine floor, coming into the main hall at the conclusion of the dinner.

The affair was, in every sense of the word, a "civic" banquet. Father Trainor numbers his friends among every religious denomination in the city and among every walk in life, and they turned out in large numbers to honor him on the silver jubilee of his Ordination. Members of parliament and legislature, the mayor and aldermen of the city, and the mayor of Copper Cliff: priests, doctors, lawyers, merchants, and fellow laborers in the vineyard of The Lord from other denominations, as well as heads of the various civic and service organizations with which Father Trainor, in his untiring energy, has been associated—all attended to add their mead of congratulation to the popular pastor.

The keynote of the gathering was best expressed by Dr. J.R. Hurlbut, M.P., who declared that it indicated the spirit of comradeship prevailing between the different peoples of Sudbury. "It is the good sympathy and fraternity engendered at such gatherings that makes good citizens," he said.

Following the conclusion of the dinner, and after those who had been served on the mezzanine floor congregated in the main hall, greetings were conveyed to the jubilarian by civic heads and leaders of organizations with which he is or has been associated. An illuminated address was presented him on behalf of Saint Joseph's Parish by Mr. P.T. O'Gorman, and a presentation from the Parish by Mr. L. O'Connor, one of the oldest members in the Parish. An address and presentation from Copper Cliff and Creighton Parishes from which he came to Sudbury, was made respectively by Mr. D.J. MacKinnon and Mr. R.A. O'Connor of Copper Cliff.

Addresses were given by Dr. J.R. Hurlbut, M.P., Mr. A.E. Collins of Copper Cliff, Hon. Chas. McCreagh, M.P., Minister of Mines, and the jubilarian, Mr. T. Murray Mulligan was chairman—Sudbury, Ont., Star.

At the Mass celebrated by Father Trainor the morning of the celebration there were present upwards of sixty priests.

Among those present at the banquet were three brothers of the jubilarian Reverend George Trainor of Vancouver, Mr. Cyril Trainor who was recently married by his brother Reverend Thos. H., and Mr. Peter C. Trainor of the C.N.R. freight department, this city who was called

on by the chairman for a short address. Mr P.C. Trainor returned home on Friday night.
