\$70,000 Rookie Pitches Victory In American League For Detroit

NEW YORK, July 24 (AP)—The Tigers' \$70,000 rookie, pitcher Freddie Hutchinson, chalked up his first American League victory today at the expense of Washington Senators, but the league leaders could not small part of their 7-5 triumph at Detroit to the relief pitching of big Alton Bentz.

Hutchinson shut out the Nats with three hits for the first five innings, but he yielded four runs and two runs in the sixth and three consecutive singles each for a count—before he was removed from the mound in the seventh.

Hank Greenberg's 18th home run of the sea on drove in two of the runs in the first inning. Detroit's margin—the league leaders hold over Cleveland Indians.

Roy Weatherly's two-run homer was the decisive factor at Cleveland as the Indians turned in their fifth straight triumph. Southpaw Al Smith received credit for

the 7-6 victory over Philadelphia. Neither Chubby Dean, the Athletics' starter, nor Smith, who pitched his 10th triumph of the season, went the distance. The Tribe gained a 7-1 lead off Dean and Herman Besse before the Athletics rallied for five runs in the sixth.

Bob Feller, kingpin of the Cleveland mound staff, was hit in the face by a thrown ball during pregame practice but was not seriously hurt.

The White Sox and Boston's Red Sox got hot in their own right and in better than 107 degree temperature at Chicago boomed out 34 hits totaling 64 bases.

Chicago got the decision, its sixth in a row, 12-10.

The barrage included six home runs, three triples and six doubles and brought into action seven pitchers, three by the White Sox.

A home run by Walt Judding with one on in the ninth inning gave the Browns a 14-12 victory over New York Yankees at St. Louis.

The named race went to Hal Britton, owned by H. Fraser of New Glasgow, N. S. The horse placed first in all three heats and was handled by Johnny Fraser of the mainland town.

Sam Walker's Moon Glow from Halifax, piloted by Joe Hood of Sydney, came through with three firsts to win the 2:21 trot and pace class and Gall Harvester, owned by Tom MacKinnay of Sydney, won easily in the 2:27 class. SOLD SWASTIKAS IN SOUTH AFRICA

WORCESTER, South Africa, July 24 (CP)—When Dr. Colin Steyn, Minister of Justice, made a statement here that immediate and effective action would be taken by the government against the "fifth column" and inimical propaganda, the gathering cheered him.

Worcester had a special reason for cheering. Even before the outbreak of war the pro-Nazi propaganda here was far too blatant.

The latest indication has been the sale of swastikas among local schoolboys. These are made of copper metal for use in button-holes. The swastika itself is worn inside the lapel of the jacket.

Several schoolboys were engaged in the sale of the Nazi emblem.

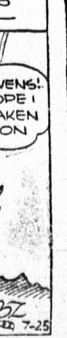

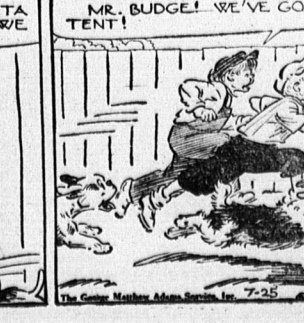
