## PROSPECTIVE CHANGES.

There were rumors current on Friday and Saturday which indicated a change in the programme before announced in these columns in regard to the Queen's County Judgeship. These rumors have been so far supported that though no appointment has been yet officially made, it is now confidently expected by Attorney General McDonald's friends that he will be the new Judge for Queen's County.

It was also reported on Friday that Mr. F. L. Hazard, Stipendiary Magistrate for this City, intended to resign that position. This rumor found a place in Saturday's Patriot, and the GUARDIAN, without having had any communication with Mr. Hazard on the subject, has reason to believe the rumor to be well founded, but it may be stated that certain parties who profess to know state that there is no foundation whatever for the report that Mr. Hazard intends to resign. The Liberal Conservatives however are suspicious and see in Mr. Hazard's resignation, a scheme to run him as the Liberal candidate in the Belfast district, which will become vacant upon Attorney General McDonald's promotion to the bench.

MR CHAS. MITCHELL, who has been in the employ of Mr. Jas. Taylor, has resigned his position. Mr. Mitchell intends opening a general bookstore in the store lately occupied by Mr. Thos. Campbell.

That the departure of these talented people will leave a gap in matters musical in this city goes without saying, and while we are glad that they have gone to better fields they will be very much missed and warmly welcomed back if they should ever come this way again.

THE list of prizes to be given by the Abegweit Crescent Bicycle and Athletic Sports on the C. A. A. Grounds has been completed. Many of our citizens have evidenced a deep interest in the day's sports and have made handsome contributions. Quite a number of Sons of Temperance of the division of that section, of which the deceased was a member, paraded at the funeral in regalia, six of whom attended as pall-bearers.

NOTES FROM TRURO PRESBYTERY. In the early morning of Wednesday May 31st: four members of Truro Presbytery, Messrs. Dickie, Smith, Parker and Coffin, set out from Upper Musquodoboit in a double seated express driven by Mr. Gordon Farnell, the general proprietor of the Minto House, for Moser River, to take part in the ordination services of Mr. A. F. Fisher who has been appointed as ordained missionary for one year over the congregation of Quoddy and Moser River. The first place called at was Sheet Harbor. After changing horses the "Presbytery" pushed on in the afternoon to Quoddy. Here they met Mr. James McIntosh of P. E. I., who is taking his theological course at Union Seminary, holding there a bursary of \$250.00 per year and who has had six years of successful mission work in New Brunswick and in the North West is the first missionary to reside here and devote his chief attention to this needy field. It has hitherto been worked in connection with Quoddy receiving monthly service. Mr. McIntosh will be able also to assist Mr. McNairn and Mr. Fisher among their widely scattered outposts and will work under the joint superintendence of these ministers.—PRES. WITNESS.

He was just recovering from a serious attack of pneumonia and was able to sit up and read. He was seized with an attack of heart failure and died in a few minutes. He leaves a young widow and child. Mr. Low had but recently gone to the Northwest, having served as assistant in St. George's Church, Toronto, prior to his appointment to Calgary.

THE Moncton Daily Times says:—J. J. McGowan, son of Mr. Wm. McGowan, of Moncton, who is attending St. Dunstan's college, Charlottetown, has been very successful as a prize winner in the recent closing exercises. He was awarded the gold medal for Education, presented by Rev. J. B. McDonald, Lisbon, N. Dak., and was equal in merit with Thomas Trainor for the special prize for Religious Instruction, presented by Rev. J. B. McDonald. 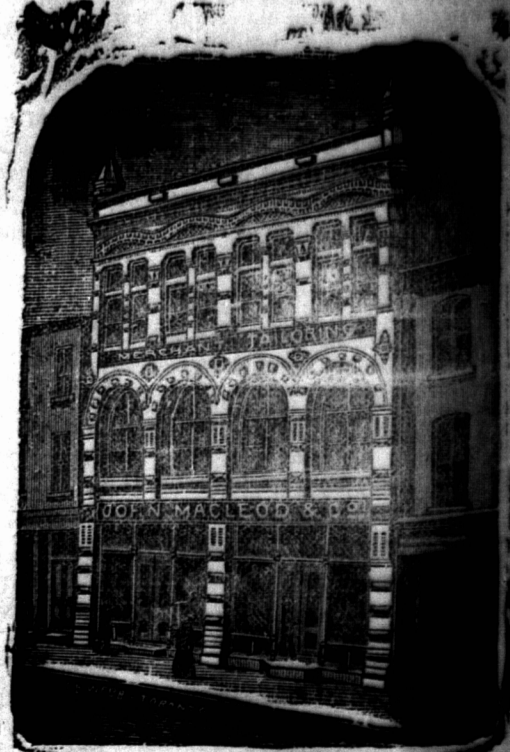
