DEAR MISS DIX—You wonder why men who love their children, who want to give them every advantage and all of whose hopes and ambitions are centered in them, wash their hands of their upbringing. I can tell you why: one father feels that the best way for him and his is to figure as little as possible in the bringing up of the children, and there are doubtless many who have his experience. It is because the mother resents any attempt of the father to control or direct the children. Because she finds out that if he attempts to take any active part in managing the children it will bring up constant conflicts between himself and his wife that will not only destroy his authority but heap on her the blame that it is better for the children to have a peaceful home and one in which the father and mother are apparently in accord than it would be for him to exercise any authority as a father. No doubt you are right and that many a father finds that the hands-off policy is the only one that he can use in dealing with a monopolistic mother. I have seen many mothers who would threaten a husband and attempt to correct the child they would turn upon the father, like a tigress defending her young, and heap abuse upon their heads. It is a great pity for the children's sake that the mothers deprive them of a father's help and guidance in their rearing, because every boy and girl need a man's firmness, a man's viewpoint and a man's broadening companionship. Mother idolatry doesn't take the place of father's influence, and we would not have so many youngsters running wild if they had a man's strong and steady hands on the reins instead of a weak woman's.

Of course, much is to be said for the father's point of view—that it is better for the children to grow up in a quiet household, even if they are reared exclusively by a weak mother, than one in which there is a conflict between husband and wife about their upbringing. But it is buying peace at a great price. It is paying for it with the children's brightness.

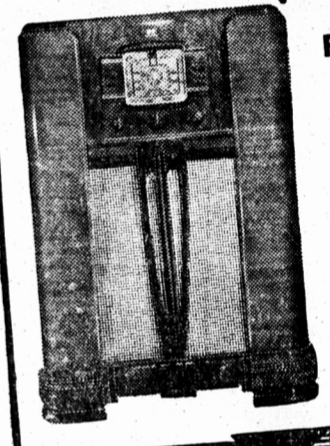
Darnley School reopened on Monday with a new principal Miss Ellen Harrington and Miss Margaret Blahany assistant.

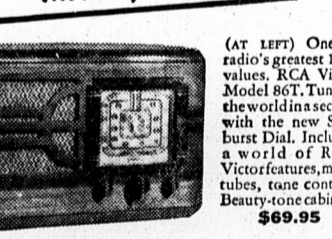
