#### A FARMER'S COMPLAINT.

A long letter of complaint from one of our intelligent farmers may be condensed into briefer space as below. He has two sons. They are not disposed to remain on the farm, nor would he keep them there if he could under present conditions. He complains of long hours of work and poor returns for labor expended and the impossibility of getting farm help when needed at rates which the farmer can pay. He blames the Government for raising the pay of its railway employees by \$750,000 a year and then levying this back upon the farmers in increased freight rates. He finds conductors getting \$100 to \$125 a month, baggage masters \$80 to \$90, brakemen from \$75 to \$80, and this but a specimen of the salaries paid to the army of Government employees throughout the country. This in face of the fact that the value of the entire products of the average Island farm is but \$561, or divided into monthly payments, \$47 a month. The farmer, his wife, sons and daughters, with an average capital of over \$2,000 must work for this, while the average train hand, without capital, working far shorter hours at lighter work receives twice as much.

These conditions our correspondent says, constitute the reason why young men leave the farms, and if they cannot get employ on the railway, leave the country. This is the reason why so many farms are offered for sale, and are sold at diminishing prices from year to year. This is the reason why there are 400 applications in for the first vacancy on the railway. And our correspondent calls upon the Farmers' Institutes to take up the question of freight rates and salaries and make the fight of their lives to secure justice and more equal conditions.

Now we give all this for what it is worth. In the city the prevalent impression is that our farmers are about as well off and live in as much comfort as any class in the community, excepting always the pampered servants of the state. In any case as the largest class in the community and organized through their institutes, if they continue to suffer wrong they have themselves to blame. The remedy is in their own hands at the polls. There is another wrong in connection with the salaries of Government officials and employees, a wrong in which the farmers are not the chief sufferers. All employees of the Government escape the income tax which all others working for salary are required to pay. This is not just. The best paid class in the community wholly escape the unwelcome income tax.

The letter of One Voter in another column calls upon our citizens to attend to their civic affairs by nominating the candidates they want, and relieving the candidates from the work of canvassing. This counsel is prudent and timely. We would be glad to see it carried into effect.

### GOVERNMENT POND.

It is time now for Government Pond to be flooded to afford the much-needed opportunity for the many to enjoy outdoor sport and exercise. In ordinary winters the Pond has long afforded a favorite place of recreation. The time when it is most available is between the coming of the first cold weather and the time of the deep winter snows. Therefore no time should be lost in flooding the Pond and getting it ready for immediate use.

Of course we have the Skating Rink and it will no doubt be liberally patronized as it has heretofore been and ought to be. Its advantages will be enjoyed all winter by those who have tickets. But for the boys and girls, especially those living in the centre and western part of the city, and for all who enjoy skating and other winter sports in the open air and with larger space, the Pond fills an important requirement of our winter pastime. By all means let it be made ready, and at once.

The Ottawa government gives out that it will vigorously prosecute the manufacturers of adulterated spices. This is well. But it is vastly more important to prosecute the bribers and the bribe-takers in our federal, provincial and municipal elections. These men are the enemies of the state and their nefarious practices constitute our greatest national danger.

The esteemed Summerside Journal seems to fear that if the Scott Act shall be repealed and the Prohibition Act takes its place the latter will be enforced. We gather this from the following sentence in the Journal's editorial on the subject: "Now, however, face to face with prohibition that prohibits both the dealer and consumer, the one from selling and the other from buying, the case is very different." There is much more of the same sort in the Journal's articles.

By all means let every elector in the Third District go to the polls and vote tomorrow. The man who sets so little value upon his vote that he will not go to the polls is not worthy of being represented. Once at the polling booth he should vote for the man whom he thinks likely to render the best service to the country. Bribery and election whiskey should be disdainfully rejected. Every candidate in his heart despises the man who can be influenced by a drink or a bribe, whether the voter be a supporter or an opposer of such candidate. And every honest neighbor will despise such a man. Let us have a clean election by self respecting electors, and may the best man win.

#### JUST HOW WE STAND.

The following is an extract from a speech delivered by B. Hal. Brown, Manager of the London & Lancashire Life Insurance Co. for Canada:
