### Veterans' Loans Changes In Force

OTTAWA, Aug. 26—(CP)—Finance Minister Abbott announced today that parliamentary amendments enlarging the purposes for which loans may be made by the chartered banks under the Veterans' Business and Professional Loans Act now have been made effective.

These changes, approved by Parliament at the recent session, follow:

1. Veterans who started a new

business between Jan. 1, 1946 and Jan. 15, 1947, may include their investment during that period as part or all of the one-third cash which veterans must be prepared to invest in a project before being able to obtain a loan for the balance under the act.

2. Veterans already in partnership may now obtain loans for the same purposes as veterans who are in business on their own account.

A change also has been made in the regulations to enable loans to be made for the purchase of buildings, with or without the land on which they are situated, to be used in carrying on the veterans' business.
