**CHILDREN LIKE ROYALTY  
 FILMS**

LONDON, Dec. 5 (CP)—Child movie fans thoroughly dislike dictators, but "royalty" scenes are high in popularity. This is shown by results of a questionnaire issued to 142 managers of London theatres where special children's matinees have been established. The likes and dislikes of children are analyzed. Of the 88 per cent who dislike foreign dictators, 53 per cent express their feelings

with books. Three per cent boo society weddings and fashion parades. News reels as a whole are liked by 83 per cent. Royalty scenes are cheered by 61 per cent of the children, military and naval scenes by 32 per cent and sports items by 30 per cent. Airplane flights arouse a vocal response from 14 per cent.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5 (AP)—Five masked men with shotguns held up 30 employees and customers in the Washington Heights Branch of the Consolidated Edison Company tonight and escaped with several thousand dollars. Police surrounded the building and barred outsiders while they questioned the witnesses. The loot was estimated at \$5,000 to \$12,000.

**Mines Minister To  
 Hear Appeal From  
 Thorburn Clergymen**

THORBURN, N. S., Dec. 5 (CP)—Rev. Alexander Mills of this Pictou County mining village without a working colliery, today received a telegram announcing an interview had been arranged for him and Rev. Ernest Cassels with Hon. T. A. Crerar, federal minister of mines and resources. Rev. Mr. Mills had sought an interview with Prime Minister Mackenzie King to bring before him the labor troubles of this village, without a colliery since the Vale mine was closed permanently late this fall. The Prime Minister was reported to have taken the stand no useful purpose could be served by an interview between himself and the Thorburn clergymen. The latter, however, persisted in demanding a meeting with federal representatives. "I feel a gross injustice has been done to the people of Thorburn and our appeal is to see that this wrong is righted," Rev. Mr. Mills said. He leaves for Ottawa today, accompanied by Rev. Father Christian, Roman Catholic parish priest here.

**NEW SNOOKER RECORD  
 CALL SERVANTS TO NEW  
 RIGHTS**

LONDON, Dec. 5 (CP)—Many domestics object to being called by their Christian names and the "courtesy of address" should be extended to domestic employment, declared a spokesman for the National Union of Domestic Workers which has drawn up a "charter of rights" ratified by the general council of the Trades Union Congress. Furthermore, the spokesman said, there was no reason why house workers should be compelled to wear caps which she considered a "trick of a bygone age." The charter, which would set up a closed shop for domestics, demands regulation of working hours and wages and includes proposals regarding living accommodation, food, holidays, uniform and the manner servants should be addressed by their employers. An explanatory statement accompanying the charter attributes the present shortage of help to "unfavorable conditions" in household service compared with other employment. The charter calls for a 48-hour week for employees over 18 years of age with a minimum wage of from 15 to 18 shillings (\$3.49 to \$4.18) a week for general workers in greater London and 25 shillings (\$5.81) for cooks. Separate two-weeks' board and wages, "reasonable facilities" for receiving visitors and other conditions of contract are asked for.

**Urge Co-ordination  
 Of All Transport**

MONTREAL, Dec. 5 (CP)—Coordination of Canada's railways and of the country's road and water transport so as to eliminate duplication was urged today by the Executive Board of The Canadian Federation of Labor at the start of its four-day convention here. The recommendation was referred to the committee on "means of the federation's 52,000 members. One resolution of the board recommended extension of Canada's armed government financial assistance to encourage house-building and other private construction, solution of the unemployment problem before immigration is again facilitated by the state or permitted on a large scale by other agencies, federal regulation of working hours by amendment to the British North America Act, legislation compelling registration of unions and exclusion of United States Labor Unions from Canada.

**Hankow Power Plant  
 Is Closed Down**

HANKOW, Dec. 5 (AP)—Hankow became a city without electric lights, heat and even its restricted emergency water service tonight as the coal supplies of the British Electricity Company were exhausted. The shutting down of the power plant forced hospitals to postpone operations. Hankow fell to the Japanese invaders Oct. 25 and a month later the British Company sought their aid to replenish the plant's fuel supply, which they warned, could last only until early December. The supply ran out tonight.

And that is as much as need be to the spiritual circumstances of Rudolf Whitlow in his youth. There is no record that his soul ever awakened. There is no record that he ever had a soul.

**GOING UP TO CAMFORD**

The country was already in a very disturbed state when Rudolf Whitlow's schooldays drew to an end. He had believed that his faculty in passing examinations would lead up through a ladder of scholarships to university or to a secure and authoritative position in the past he might have made such an ascent and rounded off his career as a formidable and successful man. But he was a conservative, the son of a man who is feared and propitiated during his lifetime and so Rudolf's path was almost before he is dead. Rudolf Whitlow wanted doing at all in business just then, and he had heard that a son at the university was an expensive responsibility. Neither of Rudolf's brothers was doing well, Sam didn't like his job. He complained that it gave him no hope whatever of promotion, but he was afraid to quit it, because jobs were now so difficult to find, and Alf, after one or two futile starts, became conscientious to a painful pitch and deeply religious. He hung about at home being inconveniently helpful, and on one occasion his mother going quietly upstairs, was horrified to find him praying on his knees. After a time he got tentative employment in Doctor Carstairs' dispensary and brightened up a little. Carstairs found him slow but very careful and exact, and spoke well of him in a fairly contemptuous way. And also he increased his pay and said encouraging things to him. But Rudolf's white face during his

last two terms at school became more and more resentful and lowering. "Write for the papers? Do tutoring?" "And eat up all my blasted time and energy!" "Better than nothing," said father Whitlow. "Look at my brothers! Look at old Sam stuck in the mud from the very start—for good and all. Look at Alf! Under-educated. Under-qualified. Making pills in slow time. Merck and holy. While young Carstairs soars away to be a great physiologist. What have you done for us? Give me my chance. See? Give me my chance, while there is a chance." "Look here, Rudolf, you've got to be reasonable. How was I to know that business was going from bad to worse? I always meant to give you a chance." "Mean! What's meant to me?" "This depression; it's got us. It's got everybody." "And did you ever do anything to prevent it? Or dodge it? Some of them have dodged it. Got you out of course it's got you. Did any of your generation ever think of escaping it? And so—here I am. One of the victors. I won't stand it, father. I'll fight. You let me go for those scholarships. See? You let me go in.
