PTE. GEORGE GOFF

Seldom has it been our painful task to record so sad a death as that of Pte. John Goff, son of Mr. and Mrs. George E. Goff, Woodville, Mills, who was accidentally killed in London, England, February 1st while awaiting transportation home.

He enlisted in Amherst, N. S., in the 193rd Battalion three years ago, and crossed to England in October 1916. He was among the first of the men of the Nova Scotia Highland Brigade to come to France, December 5th 1916 and for two years had almost continual fighting with the 55th Battalion. He fought at Vimy Ridge, Passchendaele and many others of the most trying and sanguinary battles of the war, coming out of it all without a scratch, enduring all that a trained soldier could endure, uncomplainingly.

With his battles fought and victory crowned, and his face and heart homeward turned to greet longing, loving hearts, who braved much during his departure, he passed into the eternal rest, his task was done.

Life to him was a reality, it had value, and nearly six years ago he united with the Presbyterian Church at Cardigan, and continued faithful to the end.

The writer knew him in his home, at his work, in the church and as a soldier and friend, he was true, loyal and brave, clean in thought and word and purpose, honoring his father and mother with filial piety and his life has been one of constant growth in Christian character.

Our hearts are sad, we have lost the fellowship of a true man but our loss is temporary and we have one more beckoning hand beyond.

Our deepest sympathy is extended to his father, mother, sisters and brothers (one of whom Edward Fade is at the front) and many relatives, to all of whom he was greatly endeared.
