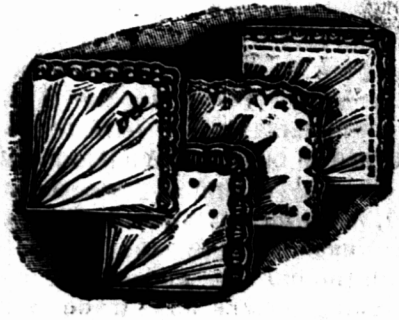

Canada and

MADE \$3,500 ROBBERY.

The Men Who Pretended to
Take Notes are Still
at Large.

MONTREAL, May 27.—The mystery
surrounding the disappearance of \$3,500
from the savings department of the
Merchants Bank of Canada, St. James
street, on Tuesday morning, has been
practically cleared up, though up to
the present no trace of the thieves can
be found.

The fact is that several men, fairly
well dressed and having the appearance
of business men, spent some time
around the rotunda of the bank on the
morning of the robbery. Two of them
had note books, in which they were
making little sketches of various portions
of the building; quietly they examined
all the points. It was all done unosten-
tantly.

The porter who never fails to get
his eagle eye on any suspicious charac-
ters, was even polite to these characters,
was even polite to these supposed as-
sistants of Architect Maxwell, who is
preparing the plans for the bank's new
building.

Mind you, the men did not say they
were Mr. Maxwell's assistants, but
they were doing exactly what assistants
would do when they were taking mea-
surements, etc., and they were clever
enough to get it rumored around the
bank that that was what they were
doing.

And so they were left to take their
observations; to time themselves as to
the moment when their scheme would
be successful; to see that the door lead-
ing from the bank proper to the inside
of the counter of the savings depart-
