THE HOME COMERS.

The home comers are now in our midst, but mainly as birds of passage. Like the birds most of them return southward again to other lands after an even shorter sojourn than is made by the birds. We would like them to stay, and to give of their intelligence to build up the land of their native. Why cannot this desirable end be brought about? In answer we shall be told that our population of over 30 to the square mile is about as many as can be maintained by farming and fishing, our chief industries. But Massachusetts, where many of our sons and daughters have made their home, supports a population of 337 to the square mile. Rhode Island with but two thirds of as many square miles as this Island supports a population four times as great as ours. The development of manufacturing

Industry in the States we have named furnishes employment for their abundant population. No doubt there are some drawbacks and obstacles in the way of this Island becoming a great manufacturing centre. We are much shut off from communication with the outside world during the winter. That is an obstacle to our manufacturing for exportation. But it ought also to be an incentive to manufacturing such goods and wares as we consume largely and now import from abroad. True, we cannot manufacture on a very large scale, for the consuming population is limited. On the other hand we have some advantages including water carriage, coal near at hand, an excellent climate and the fact that transportation charges would be much less than what the manufacturer of Montreal or Toronto must pay to send his products to us.

For instance there is a very large consumption of boots and shoes on the Island sufficient to give a business of half a million dollars yearly to a factory of good size employing a large staff of work-people permanently. We might very well have three condensed milk factories instead of the one we have, the others to be located in the east and west respectively. The annual purchase of agricultural implements and machines is quite large enough to support an extensive factory in our midst. The same may be said of the local importation of carriages and vehicles. The production of ready made clothing, starch, beet sugar, buttons, suspenders, shirts and collars, soap, fertilisers, wire fencing and cordage might each give constant employment, winter and summer in a factory. The list might be greatly extended. Constant employment at fair wages throughout the year is what is needed to keep our young people at home. Is it too much to hope that some of the home-comers who have learned these industries abroad will establish industries in their native Island and make this a land of home stayers?

Very enjoyable was the Summer School outing on the City of London yesterday.

Seldom has a distinguished visitor to this city been greeted by larger numbers than turned out to welcome the Papal Ablegate last evening.

Yesterday was England's day among the Home comers, at Summerside. Today will be Ireland's day, and promises to be a grand time. Tomorrow will be Scotland's day with the famous Caledonian sports for an attraction. "Monday for health, Tuesday for wealth and Wednesday best day of all."

Oregon, South Dakota and Utah have adopted the plan of direct legislation. The plan is that whenever a certain large percentage of the people petition the Legislature to enact a specified law, the Legislature has no alternative but to pass it. One of the laws thus enacted in Oregon provides for local option in regulating or prohibiting the liquor traffic. Other states look favorably upon the principle of direct legislation, and also upon the closely related principle that all laws enacted by the Legislature shall be subject to ratification by direct vote of the people before taking effect. A main object of the innovation is to impose a check upon legislation obtained corruptly by wealthy corporations.
