The Calcutta brought Rear Admiral Alan Everett from Bermuda to Canada to enable him to attend the West Indies Conference recently held at Ottawa. The Calcutta is the flagship of the Eight Light Cruiser Squadron and is a cruiser of the most modern type, having been launched in July, 1918, and completed after the armistice. She is 450 feet long and carries five 6-inch guns eight torpedo tubes and various small armaments. The crew number 26 officers and 300 men under Captain P. Noble, M. V. O. The presence of the large modern warship in Charlottetown harbor for a few days sojourn will no doubt help to enliven the city and stimulate interest around the water front, a most important part of the city which of late seems to have been neglected or forgotten.

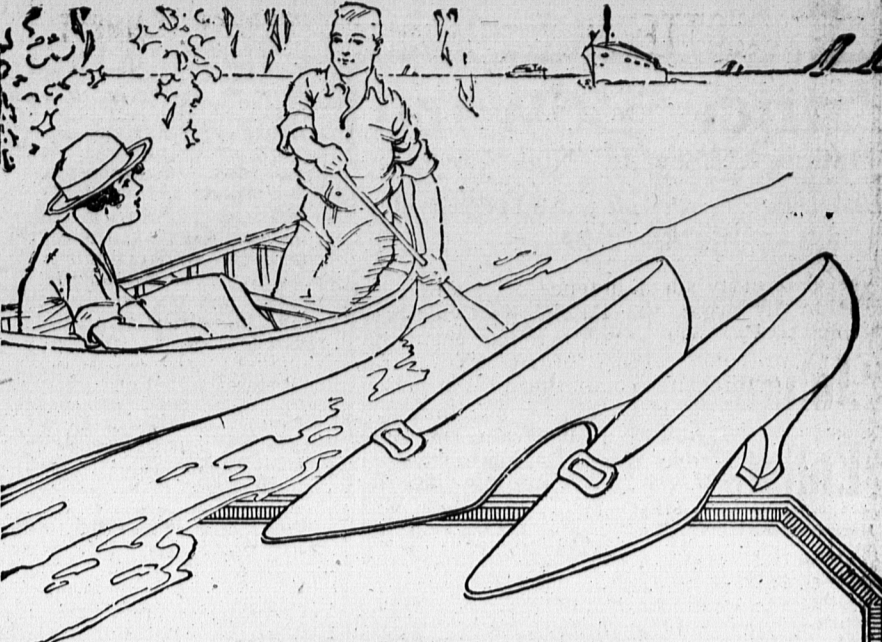
Annual Meeting of Ladies Auxiliary Protestant Orphanage

WASHINGTON, June 14.—A cure for leprosy reported as a hopeless and incurable scourge since the beginning of time is believed to have been found by medical science. The United States public health service at its station in the Hawaiian Islands has by means of the new treatment affected an apparent cure in 48 cases and although all of these cases have been released for treatment and been out under parole for almost a year there has been no sign of any recurrence.
Credit for the cure is given by the public health service to Professor L. E. Dean, head of the chemical department of the college of Hawaii, who succeeded in isolating the active constituent of chaulmoogra oil, which has long had medicinal results in the treatment of leprosy. The oil itself had been deprived of much of its value because heretofore no way had been found feasible for continued administration. Through the experiments conducted by Dr. Dean "ethylene" has been extracted from the chaulmoogra oil and this administered to patients at the leprosy investigation station at Kaili, Hawaii, under the direction of Dr. J. C. McDonald. The results of the treatment so far have been so satisfactory that lepers come willingly for treatment and a recent inspection by Hawaiian health authorities failed to disclose a single secreted case of leprosy. Following a course of treatment, extending over about a year, 48 lepers were paroled in October 1919 by a parole board made up of doctors in no way connected with the public health service.
The Public Health Service is now conducting a very careful study of the treatment, making detailed records of all cases and taking photographs of all lesions once a month. If the thorough practicability of the treatment is established it will be introduced at the leper colonies in this country in an endeavor to cleanse the United States entirely of the disease.

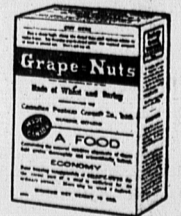
