Air Women At Home At S' Side Air Station

The women's division of the R.C.A.F. were at home to about four hundred guests at the R.C.A.F. station at Summerside on Wednesday afternoon.

It was an unforgettable experience for most of the women present. They were conducted on a two-hour tour of the station and saw how the girls of the R.C.A.F. work and how they spend their leisure hours. At the conclusion of the afternoon they were all quite willing to admit that the girls of the women's division are each and everyone doing a man's job.

The guests were received by Mrs. A. Lewis, wife of the commanding officer, Section Officer Jackson, Senior W.D. Administrative Officer and Section Officer Patche, Keating, Officer in Charge of the station. Present also were Group Captain Lewis, Squadron Leader R.E. Ellis Senior Administrative Officer and Flight Lt. E.R. Woodside, Protestant Chaplain. Among the guests were Mrs. Walter Jones, wife of the Premier of Prince Edward Island, Mrs. T.A. Campbell, Mrs. Greelam MacArthur and Mrs. E. Blake of Charlottetown.

The guests were conducted in groups of fifteen around the station visiting most of the sections in which the women's division are working. Also the airwomen's barracks and the W.D. officers' barracks. One department that aroused much interest was the parachute unit. It was explained that every parachute there had been packed by an airwoman and it was stressed that in this respect all airwomen are dependent for their lives on the women's division.

At the conclusion of the tour tea was served in the airwomen's canteen by the airwomen under Section Officer K. Wilson, station messing officer.

This at home, along with many others across Canada, was held to acquaint club women and their friends with the airwomen who live in the R.C.A.F. among the societies represented were the Red Cross Corps of Summerside and Charlottetown, the O.D.E., the Royal Canadian Order of Eastern Ladies, Catholic Women's League, St. Lad's Auxiliary of the Legion, Prince County Hospital Ladies Aid and various church auxiliaries.

Some of the prisoners at the Prince County Jail in Summerside have been leading exciting lives—at least for prisoners. During the day they would be confined to their cells but when night shadows fell they went wherever they pleased. The jailer would lock them up at the usual hour and on counting his charges would find them all present and accounted for. Likewise in the morning they would all be there but presumably they never noticed that some of them did not look as refreshed as one would expect, after a good night's sleep. Yes, it was a good life while it lasted, but it wasn't enough for the wanderers to enjoy their nocturnal excursions quietly. The bright lights called, and they were seen, like unto the moths that flutter close to the flame and their wings were singed. Now the Summerside jail is normal again at night, no further figures are being swung into the night to return at break of dawn.

It is pleasing to see so many interested persons in attendance at the evening show which is playing such an important role in Canada's economic program, said His Honour, Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, at the Revue at the Holy Name Hall on Wednesday. "I sincerely hope that the lesson it teaches on the practical suggestions of the women of the Province long after Mrs. Aitken has left our shores.

"In the difficult days which lie ahead such practical suggestions will be given here tonight should go a long way in solving the perplexing problems which are only now beginning to be felt in many homes. Conservation has been increasingly emphasized in the past few months and more and more in the future Canada will be asked to adjust themselves to conditions as they develop.

The field of clothing conservation, because of the dearth of supplies due to increasing war needs, offers a real challenge but one which I feel the women of Prince Edward Island will be well able to meet. With more sons in the armed forces than any other province, the mothers of this island can better understand the need for stretching present supplies in order that the boys who are doing the actual fighting will go into battle properly clothed. Knowing that already fifty-five million miles of cloth have gone into uniforms for the army, Canadians can fully realize the need for conservation.

"Every time a mother takes an old coat or suit and makes it over into a dress or coat for junior, she is doing her part to guard and maintain the home front. Every time she re-makes any article of clothing she is being a good soldier on the civilian front. Now is the time to sew, save and serve."

"The War-time Prices and Trade Board is doing everything in its power to stretch out the existing supplies of cloth and garments by its program of simplification and rationalization, but without the active co-operation of every citizen

in Canada its efforts are thwarted to a certain degree. Not only must it be backed by public opinion but it must also have the hearty support of an army of women using scissors, needles and threads as their weapons.

ask to transport armies and keep them supplied over intervening seas.

Warns Against Complacency "And we have got to reckon on this being a long one," Sir Patrick warned. "We have got to steel ourselves to great sacrifices yet. We must make the job as hard as we can. Think of our prisoners, think of the oppressed people whom the aggressors have overrun, to whom each day is an agony. We cannot be complacent. No limit can be set to our efforts. We must be ready to do anything to help when such mortal distress is so close on the other side of the curtain of our actual sight, and when literally all we have left to hold dear ourselves is still at the hazard.

"Huge developments are taking place in Canada," Sir Patrick said. "There is the Alaska Highway; there are the growth of the industries; there is the newly created Navy; and merchant fleet; there is the air force and Canada's pivotal situation on the air routes of the world. No limit can be set to the destiny of Canada in this war. But there is only slavery for her and for the rest of us if it is lost. And now or never is the hour."
