A PETITION for the commutation of the death sentence against Alred C. Williams, alias McWilliams, formerly of Summerside, P. E. I., convicted of the murder of John Gallo, an Italian laborer, at Lynnhill, this state, on July 28, 1897, has been presented to Gov. Wolcott. It asks that the death penalty be revoked and that Williams be given a life sentence instead. The petition is signed by ten thousand names. It is claimed that the evidence on which Williams was convicted was uncertain and altogether circumstantial. If the sentence is not commuted Williams will be hanged at Salem on Oct. 1. Williams, who was at one time employed by several P. E. I. horsemen, has several brothers near Boston.—St. John Sun.

A CHARLOTTETOWN correspondent to the St. John Sun, says: Much interest is taken in the Chiasson-Walls case now before the county court at Newcastle. Mr. Chiasson, of Prince Edward Island, a middle aged, good looking Frenchman, professed to love Mrs. Elizabeth Walls, of Chatham. She was somewhat older than he, far from beautiful, but she had some money. The fond lover soon requested and secured a loan from his devoted fiancée. Subsequently, when threatened by creditors, he transferred his real estate in Tignish to her, getting \$1,500 in cash and notes for \$4,000. The deeds were not recorded, and, at his request, were returned to him, and are still in his possession, but the buildings and the property have been burned, and Mrs. Walls died, and Mr. Chiasson sues for the \$4,000. The defence in the case is that the sale of the property to Mrs. Walls was not a bona fide transaction, but merely to prevent Chiasson's creditors from swooping down on him. The love letters that passed between the lovely pair have been read in court, to the delight of a large audience. G. F. Gregory for defendants, and Robt. Murray and L. J. Tweedle for the plaintiff.

OBITUARY.—In the death of Francis E. Young, which occurred at 2 o'clock Thursday morning, Earncliffe has lost one of her prominent young men. He had been residing at River Point, R. I., for a few years, but about a year ago, his health began to fail and he returned to his native province hoping that with a few months' rest, he would regain strength, and for a time it appeared that his hopes were to be realized. But about two months ago he began to fail and in spite of all that skilled physicians and good nursing could do he passed away on the 15th inst. Mr. Young always took a prominent part in everything that tended toward the improvement of Society. He was a prominent member of Cherry Valley Lodge, I. O. G. T., where his presence and influence will be greatly missed. He also held Vice President of the E. D. C. and occupied a seat on the Executive of the same institution, and there, probably as in no other place, except his own home will his absence be so much felt. The funeral took place from his father's residence, on Friday afternoon, and the esteem in which the deceased was held was shown by the large number of people who followed his remains to their last resting place in Cherry Valley. Deceased was a son of Mr. John P. Young.

BOAT RACES.—The boat races to be held next Monday are already causing some excitement among the lovers of aquatic sports. D. Nicholson, Esq., C. The committee are taking great pains to make such arrangements as will make the race interesting to the citizens generally. A Quebec despatch to the Halifax Herald speaking of Mr. McCurdy says: Lord and Lady Aberdeen while residents of New Richmond took a lively interest in the Presbyterian church in that place. He thought a nurse thus employed would not only do a permanent good while with the people but after her departure the good effects of her stay would be noticeable in the added knowledge of the best treatment of the sick. Rev. J. F. McCurdy, the pastor, then asked for an expression of opinion, an invitation which Dr. Thornton quickly accepted, thanking his excellency for his kind and eminently thoughtful and appropriate offer. R. H. Montgomery, in the name of the congregation, spoke in the same way. The offer was cordially accepted by the minister on behalf of the people.
