**Europe Is Struggling To Grow Enough Food To Fight Horror of Starvation Next Winter**

 WASHINGTON, (NEA).—Europe is spending its last ounce of energy in an effort to grow enough food to stave off the horror of starvation for next winter which it now is experiencing.  
 And the prediction is that this heroic struggle will be rewarded with a harvest between 80 and 90 per cent of normal pre-war food production. The experts say this will leave Europe with a need for about one-quarter of what she is asking for for this year, for next winter. This doesn't diminish the present need for food, however, because the results of a good harvest won't be felt until late this summer. In fact it is claimed that the more food sent over now the more effort Europeans will be able to put into helping themselves for next winter.  
 Here are some comments from U. S. officials who have just returned from the famine-stricken areas in Europe on what the people are doing to help themselves:  
 "It's a common sight in Greece and other countries to see farmers and their children tugging at plows and crop hoeing devices across fields. The wives go behind trying to keep the plow straight. They have no oxen or mules to do this work."

**SHARE OXEN, PLOWS**  
 Little children who look almost too weak to stand up can be seen working on every farm, weeding and doing whatever task they can to aid in getting a good harvest for next summer.  
 "The city people and office workers are doing all they can to help the farmers. In many places employees are being permitted to leave their offices at places of business as early as one o'clock in the afternoon to go to work on farms and collect seed, fertilizer, insecticides and other things which have become the common practice in many areas for farmers to pool or share horses, oxen, and even a hoe or a plow. And anyone who can hold a spade or a rake and can use it is much sought after."  
 The struggle to get farms in Europe and the rest of the world back to normal production has been epic. The United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration has spent more than \$200,000,000 for agricultural rehabilitation in these war-torn countries. This has paid for farm equipment, livestock, seed, fertilizer, insecticides and other things which have become the common practice in many areas for farmers to pool or share horses, oxen, and even a hoe or a plow. And anyone who can hold a spade or a rake and can use it is much sought after.

To help Europe regain its agricultural feet, desperately needed agricultural machinery, like these UNRRA tractors shown at work in Serbia, are being rushed abroad. Crops these tractors are helping plant will aid the situation next winter, but they won't diminish the present need for food.



**NO STATISTICS YET**  
 The North African wheat crop should be close to 90 per cent of normal. This country usually exports wheat but its population has increased close to 20 per cent and will probably consume its own crop.  
 Experts say it is still too early in the crop season to give any statistics on just how much food Europe will grow for itself. The weather will grow for itself. If it continues favorable, they say, the 80 to 90 per cent estimate might be realized. They claim it is difficult to make comparisons with pre-war years because there were few accurate crop statistics recorded before the war.

**PROTECTS LIVE STOCK**  
 According to the annual report of the Veterinary Director General of Canada, 135,026 empty stock cars and 26,186 trucks were disinfectant during the fiscal year ended March 31, 1945. Ministerial order No. 37 requires that all empty stock cars arriving at certain designated points be cleaned and disinfected. Trucks which have carried live stock are also disinfected at certain points. The work is carried out under the supervision of the Contagious Diseases Section of the Division of Animal Industry, Dominion Department of Agriculture.
