Surprises Mark Opening Of The N.H.L.

(By Jack Calder, Canadian Press Staff Writer) Only three playing nights old, the National Hockey League campaign already had produced enough arguments, injuries and surprises for half an ordinary winter.

Even before opening night last Thursday, Eddie Shore threw a young bombshell into Boston Bruins' camp by announcing a strike for more money.

Shore's holdout, though, was supplanted in prominence by the swift rise of Chicago Black Hawks and the beating taken by Toronto Maple Leafs.

There isn't any question about the strength of the Hawks, who had everyone calling them fortunate when they won the Stanley Cup over Toronto last spring.

The hard times which have hit the Leafs find them a little shaky. Buzz Bell went out with a charley horse in the first game and Gordie Drillon, the league's leading scorer last season, suffered a broken thumb in the second.

It's too early yet to pass judgment upon Montreal Canadiens and Detroit Red Wings, who have played only one game each and lost that. No one has ever doubted that the Canadiens will be powerful when they get going.

But, where they have license to take some of the lockers on are taking pot-shots at New York Americans after a single start. Chicago beat the Americans 6-1 in that one and the boys said Red Dutton's club for breaking it up.

Canadian Open Golf Tournament To Be Staged Over Saint John Course

TORONTO, Nov. 9—(CP)—Canada's Open Golf Championship in 1938 will be held at the Riverside course, Saint John, N. B. B. L. Anderson, secretary of the Royal Canadian Golf Association, announced here today.

Mr. Anderson said Saint John had been selected at a meeting of the R. C. G. A. executive held in Montreal last Friday.

The championship will be held during the last two weeks in August but a definite announcement cannot be made as to the exact date for some little time, he said.

In the interest of golf the committee feels the championship should be passed around as far as is possible, in order that all people in the Dominion interested in the game may have the opportunity of seeing the world's outstanding players perform.

The only other tournaments which supersede the Canadian Open in importance are the British and United States Open meets. The rapid growth in the popularity of the game in this part of Canada and success of the exhibition match between Lighthorse Harry Cooper, former Canadian Champion, and Jimmy Thomson, Lawson Little and Horon Smith at Riverside last summer are believed largely responsible for the selection of the Riverside course for the biggest Canadian event of the year.

Slammin' Sam Snead, who won the title from Lighthorse Harry Cooper in a thrilling extra-hole match on Toronto's Mississauga course last August, will defend his title against a field of the best amateurs and professionals in the world, including Cooper, Smith, Little, Sandy Somerville, several times champion and a host of other top-ranking shotmakers.

The noted pros who played the Riverside course last summer agreed that it would be an ideal course for the open and that they would assist in any way to make it a success.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Nov. 9—Golf officials in New Brunswick were delighted tonight when informed that the Canadian open golf championship next summer would be held at the Riverside Golf and Country Club here.

"I am very glad," said C. J. Jones, Woodstock, president of the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Golf Association. "It will be a great assistance to golf in the Maritimes."

The association would expect the support of its members in making the meet a success, said Mr. Jones. Keen interest shown when four leading golfers of Canada and the United States played an exhibition match at Riverside last summer indicated that Maritimers were anxious to see good golf.

The Riverside course, considered one of the finest on the continent, is situated on hills overlooking the Kennebecas River seven miles from Saint John. It commands a view of miles along the river.

In the last four years the course has been rebuilt under supervision of Donald Ross, outstanding United States golf architect. Fairways and greens have been brought to a state of near perfection.

The course embodies newest features of golf architecture, including hedges, greens and bunkers and trap scientifically placed so as to reward good shotmakers and penalize poor ones.

Unusually hilly, the course was largely cut out of the forest. Most of the holes are bordered by woods and trees surround some of the greens.
