Dempsey Favored

IN THE WALL STREET BETTING ON CHAMPION'S FIGHT WITH GENE TUNNEY.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—Definite selection of Philadelphia as a battle ground for the Dempsey-Tunney title fight has brought about a revival of wagering with Wall Street quoting odds of 2 to 1 in favor of the champion.

One firm of betting commissionaires reported placing \$10,000 to \$5,000 on Dempsey's chances on this basis.

Despite strong support for Tunney it was the opinion in financial circles that these odds would lengthen in the interval remaining before the bout.

Wide of Sweden Is To Race Nurni

MANY EXPECT TO SEE FAMOUS FINN BEATEN—EVENT IN SWEDEN.

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 21.—A race Nurni and his Swedish rival, Edvin Wide, will be run in the middle of September in Berlin. Wide, who is a Stockholm school teacher is said to be the only runner in Europe who can force Nurni to extend himself. In a recent race in Finland, at 2,000 meters, Nurni was by less than one second.

Although followers of Wide have declared for some time that the great Swedish athlete could take the measure of the fleet Nurni, there are perhaps more authorities on track and field who take the other view. Wide is walking right into Nurni's territory if he selects 2,000 metres, but past performances indicate that he will quite a contest of it, and while American critics believe the Finn will win in nothing certain about the result of the race. Recent reports have indicated that Wide is running better this year than ever before and it just might be that he will take the measure of the vaunted Nurni.

In an interview she said that \$100,000 is a lot of money, and if some one offered me that much to turn professional about the race, I would not think about it. I think Miss Longlen's appearance here will be very interesting. It is something new, a tennis player turning professional, but Miss Longlen will undoubtedly attract thousands of persons and create a greater interest in tennis.

CHICAGO, Aug. 21.—Miss Helen Willis, women's national amateur champion, has had no thought of turning professional as Miss Suzanne Longlen has done because she has had no offers to do so.

In Thompson Dillon and Miss Dillon, the Dillon Arrowby family has a pair of high class race horses that can make their presence felt in any company. It is true that their best showing this season has been on the half-mile tracks but class counts as much there as on the larger oval.

At Windsor when Thompson Dillon defeated the favorite Marmada a few thought that the Belwin could not make as bold a bid for victory as he did at Starbridge in June. This may have been true but when he did try the following week at Springfield Thompson Dillon raced him into submission in the first heat. After that he jumped and the battle was off.

This year the best of the Belwin trotters are led by Sumatra and Marm. They have won the fastest company. Sumatra has been on the complaining list since she was foaled. Notwithstanding that handicap whenever she went to the post in trim to finish a race there was never any doubt of the result.

Another line in which class predominates was founded by Peter the Great. He was a bred horse in which the trotter, pacer, saddle horse and thoroughbred were blended. His trotting lines were not noted for courage, Nancy Hanks and Jack being the only members of the family that ever made their presence felt in the highest racing circles. Still from him came a flood of racing material that never appeared.

Before this horse's pedigree was established John E. Madden maintained that there was in the inheritance of Peter the Great a stout and rapid of racing blood which prompted his get to race true under all kinds of conditions in any company. It was found in Queen Bees, the Lexington mare which produced Creole, a horse that was for years buried under the name of Walter Johnson Horse. This find also strengthened Madden's belief that the trotter at the foundation traced either to the thoroughbred or ran into the bush.

The class which Peter the Great passed on to his get carried Mabel Trask through her remarkable series of races and made Miss Hanks the first pacemaker to race into the two minute list.

Also carrying on through the generations and daughters of Peter the Great is the speed of Peter Madden, the most remarkable fast trotter that ever lived. Rose Scott, Hollywood Susan and host of others.

Canada contributed its sample of class in the bunch of pacers bearing the Grattan Royal label. It is an old story that Grattan Royal was discarded as a loose knocking racer until his get opened the account of it almost half of his life was wasted. Still in time Low Grattan and Roy Grattan were followed by Tarzan Grattan, Jean Grattan while there are many more prospective stars in sight.

Among the early trotters Dexter was the most conspicuous example of class in the light harness horse. From the day he was broken to harness Clara's colt had the whip and dash which stamp champions as their own.

Woodruff recognized while Doble reached the zenith when he drove him in 2:17 1/4. The however, drove in this performance as it did when he raced Ethan Allen and running mate and forced the pair to go in 2:15 to win.

Still if Dexter is to be exploited what can be said of Goldsmith Maid? She was also a world's champion and she had her greatest campaign when she was eighteen years old. To her race day was an old story. When the bell rang she trembled in her eagerness to get into the fray but jogged to the wire without a ripple as soon as Doble was in the sulky.

Nancy Hanks was another trotter in which class was very conspicuous. She raced every horse that took the word with her into heat. Her legs bothered her near the end of her career. Some might say she would roll over in the stall and stick her feet into the air to reduce the circulation in them but all was forgotten when she appeared on the track.

Class and not numbers fixes the reputation of a sire of racing material. That almost undefinable quality which prompts a horse to make another bid for victory when his competitors are fading above where the acid stamp of merit should be placed. It does not come by chance. It shows where the racing quality was bred in.

Every one who goes to the races can recall a number of horses which rushed off in front but tailed off as soon as one of the stout hearted trailers looked them in the eye. For years the Tennessee Hals were the most formidable characters among the pacers while the Dictator and George Wilkes strains were as conspicuous among the trotters. Strange to relate the time blended through Direct and a mare by Tom Hall. The first sample of the combination was the unbeaten Direct Hal with which Geers made a sweep through the Grand Circuit. Of the Wilkes strains all of them have faded except the Artzell and McKinney strains. The latter run to Alcrop and the former to William L. That both are still prominent can be seen every week in the reports of the race meetings. The leaders are Guy Arrowby, Dillon Arrowby, Belwin and Sam Prisco.

At the present time Guy Arrowby is represented on the turf by Guy Richard, Guy Ozark and Guy McKinney, as high class a trio in any company as ever took the word since 1924 Guy Richard won at Kalamazoo in 2:04 1/4. With fair racing luck he should add another name to his sire's two minute list.

Toledo Guy Ozark showed his quality by winning from Rose Scott and Great Belle in 2:02 1/4 while the victory of Guy McKinney in the Matron Stake made him the first outstanding three year old in 1925.
