McNeill, who was present for the occasion, was then called upon, having two sons on active service in France, he was in a position to give valuable information as to the duties and experiences of a soldier and assured Frank that the prayers and the good wishes of his friends would go with him. Mr. Robert Agnew was the next speaker. He said that actions were louder than words and that the gift which had just been presented to Frank represented the esteem and good will of every family in Wilmot school district and also quite a number from adjoining districts. Speeches were also delivered by Mr. A. R. McMurdo, Rev. Mr. Marsh (returned missionary from India) another of Frank's uncles, Messrs. John A. Burrows, T. J. Humphry and J. Curtis. The singing of the National Anthem brought that part of the program to a close. The ladies then served refreshments while Miss Ruth McGregor entertained the company to selections on the piano. McDonald, of Bedeque; Robert Agnew, Wilmot Valley; Judson Simpson, W. H. McGregor, Fulton Simpson, of Lot 16; J. L. Tennant, John Grady, of Summerside, and W. A. Brown, of Ottawa. After reading minutes of last meeting, etc., the matter of next year's fair was brought up and it was moved and carried that a Fair be held and that the President, Rev. P. C. 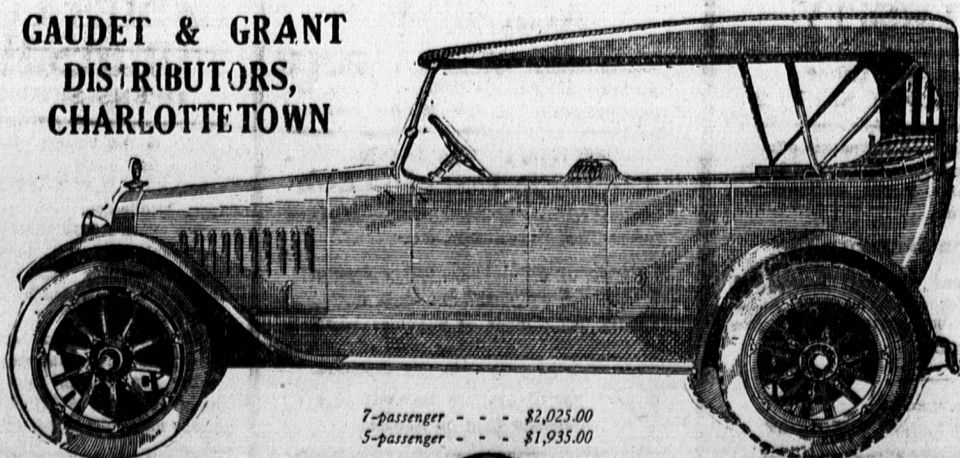
