PRAIRIE PROVINCES AND MARITIME PROVINCES GRAIN.

The Department of Agriculture has issued an interesting report on the field crops of Canada giving the total estimated yield and the yield per acre by Provinces at the end of August last. It shows the estimated crop of wheat, oats and barley for all Canada to be 445,420,000 bushels, which is 129,188,000 bushels less than last year. It also shows that the falling off was principally due to the drought in the three Prairie Provinces, while the other Provinces show gains of 2,633,000 bushels of wheat, 23,219,000 bushels of oats and 625,000 bushels of barley.

The estimated production of wheat for the whole of Canada is 122,785,000 bushels, of which 17,750,000 is fall wheat, raised wholly in Ontario, with the exception of a little over a million bushels in Alberta. Ontario raises fall wheat chiefly, and had a good crop, estimated at 27.35 bushels to the acre. The estimated average per acre in the three prairie provinces for wheat is 11.89 bushels, for oats 20.96 bushels and for barley 14.49 bushels for the area sown.

Compare these yields with those of the Maritime Provinces. Wheat in P. E. Island is estimated to yield 21.28 bushels per acre, in Nova Scotia 21.91 and in New Brunswick 21.72. This is not far short of double the yield in the prairie country.

Oats in P. E. Island are estimated at 37.50 bushels, in Nova Scotia 37.10 and in New Brunswick 33.72 bushels, which is far better than in the prairie country, and barley is 29.95 for P. E. Island, 30.04 in Nova Scotia and 28.97 in New Brunswick, or twice as much per acre as in the prairie Provinces. It is true that we do not raise grain so extensively as it is raised in the Northwest, as here mixed farming, dairying and stock-raising are

THE MARITIME PROVINCES AND THE TARIFF.

One Beccles Wilson a while ago contributed to the London Times a statement as to the attitude of the Canadian people towards protection. He found that it was only the people of the Northwest who are clamoring for free trade, and concluded that "the intelligence of the West is hardly comparable to that of the East."

He further flatters the Eastern Provinces by the statement that Nova Scotia and New Brunswick have furnished four-fifths of the eminent men of Canada. The Montreal Witness in reply points out that the people in the Northwest are largely made up of the more active and vigorous of the eastern populations, and that those who are raising the tariff reduction cry are chiefly Canadians from the East. The Witness adds:

"We should be almost willing to submit the question of tariff reduction to the people of the Provinces named, including with them Prince Edward Island, which, if the Halifax people have forgotten it, has sent forth sundry very able men. The fact is that with the exception of the pampered steel interests of Nova Scotia, those Provinces are simply victims of the Canadian tariff. Before federation their home was on the mountain wave; they had ships on the seven seas; their people were wealthy and of the sea. At confederation they objected to union because of the Canadian tariff, which small as it then was, cut them off from their world-wide commerce and made them tributary to Canada. When the tariff was doubled and made frankly pro-

tection this condition grew worse. We believe that outside of the glamor of the great steel and coal interests and others that have demanded protection, however little it might serve them, the people of the Maritime Provinces would, if polled, demand a purely revenue tariff."

We believe The Witness to be entirely right in its estimate of the sentiments of the people of the Maritime Provinces in regard to tariff reduction. It is certainly right in declaring that with the exception of the pampered steel interests of Nova Scotia these Provinces are simply the victims of the protective tariff. Before 1878 all the leading organs of public opinion in the Maritime Provinces, in St. John, Halifax and Charlottetown were advocates of a

It will be seen that our total of bushels for the three kinds of grain is larger than either of the sister Provinces, while in barley Nova Scotia led and in oats the New Brunswick crop was a little larger than ours, but on a considerable larger area. There is surely some encouragement in all this for the Prince Edward Island farmer to stick to his farm and cultivate the fertile soil of his native land.

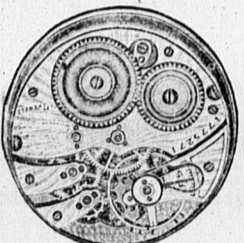
