A GENEROUS RESPONSE.—The call for Christmas gifts to the Island soldiers on Salisbury Plains was abundantly answered, and more gifts than were actually needed were received. To-day the gifts will be shipped in 14 cases, valued at \$500. Included in the boxes is a parcel for each Islander on Salisbury Plains, containing a Baluchava cap, albatross belt, 2 pairs socks, pair mitts, scarf, coloured handkerchief, a plum pudding, fruit cake, candy, 2 or 3 tins tobacco, a number of packages of cigarettes, a pipe and chewing gum. Each parcel is labelled and bears the name of the soldier for whom it is intended. The parcels were left over after parcel had been made up for every Island soldier in England, will be sent to the Island volunteers at St. John. A number of parcels apart from those donated were sent by friends of the boys along with the lot.

The number who will now be on active service either at home or abroad is as follows:—Artillery: 66 men, 3 officers to Sydney; 56 men, 3 officers, to Canada; 25 men now overseas; 30 men, 2 officers for overseas; 82nd Battalion: 20 men, 6 officers now overseas; 56 men, 1 officer for overseas, in St. John; 56 men, 3 officers at Halifax. Signalling Corps: 6 signallers now overseas; 2 signallers and 1 officer to Halifax. Army Medical Corps: 16 men, 2 officers now overseas; P. E. I. Light Horse: 20 men now overseas.

Carter to say good-bye to their son, Mr Grove Carter, who is about to leave for the front. After some remarks by Rev. Mr Littlejohns, the choir sang "Franklin's Farewell" on behalf of the Sunday School presented Mr Carter with a five dollar gold piece, with the wish that he would have a pleasant trip and would return safely to share in the welcome which awaits all the volunteers. Mr Carter leaves this morning for Halifax with the Heavy Artillery.

HOME GUARD.—The third turnout of the Charlottetown Home Guard took place last evening. Three large companies fell into line and went through a number of different movements. Capt. Prowse had charge of No. 1 Company, Capt. Ewen McDougall No. 2 Company and Capt. Landrigan No. 3 Company. After about an hour's drill the different companies assembled and selected their other officers in connection with each company and also chose the night patrol drill. No. 1 Company will turn out Thursday evenings, No. 2 Company Tuesday evening and No. 3 Company Friday evenings. This was deemed the best method, as so many men drilling as last evening made the work difficult for the officers in the different companies. The turnout last evening was very encouraging, and citizens of different ages, ranging from 18 to 65, enjoyed the discipline imposed upon them.

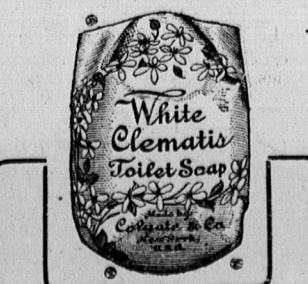
POTATO EMBARGO NOT LIFTED.—Information received in Charlottetown yesterday indicates the report that embargo had been removed. Mr James Carragher, agent for the Plant Line Steamship Co., here yesterday got word by telegram from the Boston Office that the embargo was still on Canadian potatoes. Hearing that embargo had been removed, a number of farmers took potatoes to the Plant Line wharf in Charlottetown, expecting them to go forward to Boston to-day (Friday) by the steamer. The telegram received yesterday forbids this, however, and the potatoes on hand in the warehouse on wharf will not be sent. For this reason Mr Carragher requests those who brought potatoes, expecting them to go forward to-day on strength of embargo being removed, to the wharf to take them away again.
