Island in that hospital, and they knew names on the quilt.

SCHOOL CLASSES—As pupils have been entering Grade I of the City Schools at any time during the term when they cannot possibly keep up with the work of the class and only retard the work of the other pupils, it has been decided by the School Board that children should be allowed to enter Grade I in September and January only. The City Schools will close for the Easter holidays on Thursday, April 6th at 3 p.m. and re-open on Monday, April 17th at 9 a.m.

EGGS & POULTRY—Egg receipts to date this week are still showing a considerable increase over last week. Quality continues good. Supplies are in excess of demand with one cart lot this week being placed into storage for Special Products Board. P. E. I. grading stations are quoting for ungraded eggs delivered: A Large 30-3; A Medium 28-30; A Pullet 28-7; C 20-3. Graded shipments delivered Charlottetown: A Large 34 1/2-35 1/2; A Medium 32 1/2-33 1/2; A Pullet & B 28 1/2-30. Specialized producers are receiving for cartoned pack: A Large 37; A Medium 35; B Pullet 32. Poultry receipts are practically nil.

P. E. I. GIRLS' WORK BOARD MEETS—The Prince Edward Island Girls' Work Board of the M. R.E.C. met on Thursday, March 30th, at the Baptist Parsonage, Charlottetown, the president, Mrs. L. M. Murray presided. Plans were made for a Provincial C.G.I.T. Camp to be held in July, when the National Girls' Work Secretary, had been distributed to the members. It was discussed in detail. The Board outlined the reply which is to be prepared and forwarded by the Secretary of the Board. Mrs. T. J. Humphrey, Further meetings of the Board will be held soon to complete plans for what will be the best C.G.I.T. Camp held in this Province for many years.

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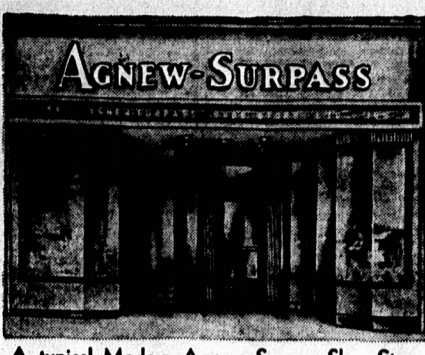


