EXPLOIT VON HINDENBURG'S
PRISITGE FOR PARTY POLIT-
ICAL PURPOSES

BERLIN, Nov. 17.—In summoning
Marshal von Hindenburg to Berlin for
the National Assembly Commission
inquisition, the Government started
something which it may be unable to
check. Incidentally, it gives National-
ists, reactionaries and militarists a
wonderful chance to exploit von Hin-
denburg's prestige for party political
purposes.

Vowaeerts headlines the incident,
"The von Hindenburg Scandal," while
anxious Democratic and Socialist cir-
cles see a deep-laid plot against the
Government, with Hefflerich and Lud-
endorff as ringleaders, to start the
reactionary ball rolling, which may
end in a nation-wide Nationalistic av-
schanche.

But other storm signals from num-
erous reactionary centres are notice-
able. More serious than Berlin's stud-
ent demonstration are the results of
the new elections to the East Prus-
sian Parliament, which were a big
success for the German National party
and a defeat for the Socialists, the
Government majority parties electing
only 34, against 48 Nationalists.

Another sign of the times was
shown during the revival of the old
Schiller play, "A Plasco in Berlin."
The audience misunderstood the pas-
sage about the revolution and democ-
racy and burst into a spontaneous en-
thusiastic demonstration for monarchy.
Prof. Prusse, the principal author of
Germany's new constitution, told the
democratic Association of Schoen-
burg, "The German nation behaves
like a fever patient, tossing from one
side to the other."

**DRASTIC ORDERS FOR THE SAV-
ING FUEL SUPPLIES**

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 19.—With
coal miners of the country still re-
luctant to return to work, drastic or-
ders for curtailment of fuel have
gone into effect throughout Indiana.
Reports from over the state today
were to the effect that an order is-
sued by the Indiana Public Service
Commission to discontinue service
for electric signs, show window illu-
mination, fountains, and other non-
essential of gas, water and electricity
had been virtually carried out.
In Indianapolis the streets had the
appearance of the lightless nights of
war time.
In the coal fields there was no
change in the situation, the miners
remaining firm.

May Close Cotton Mills

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 18.—Closing
down of numbers of cotton mills
and other plants in the south within
a few days was foreseen today in
an order of the regional coal com-
mittee of the railroad administra-
tion discontinuing their supplies of
coal. The order was announced as
"imperatively necessary because of
the failure of miners in the coun-
try's coal producing regions to re-
turn to work," although the soft
coal strike call had been cancelled.

Negotiations At Standstill

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Neg-
otiations between bituminous coal
miners and operators in the cen-
tral competitive field continued at
a standstill today. The operators
again obtaining postponement of
the joint conference of wage scale
committees on the ground that their
counter-proposal had not been com-
pleted.

The operators were said to be
considering very carefully where
the money to pay wage increases
would come from.
Rumors that the operators had
asked for a conference with Fuel
Administrator Garfield, to learn
how much of an increase in the cost
of production due to wage advances
could be passed on to the consum-
ing public, were denied again today
by Dr. Garfield.
The possibility of federal control
of the mines in case of popular dis-
approval of higher prices of coal
was said to be receiving the close
attention of the operators.

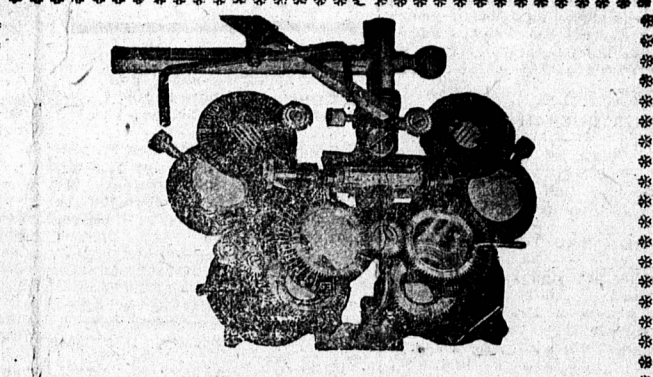
