The sixteen-ton schooner Alma out of Lameque, N.B. was grounded last night off West Point, P.E.I., and her skipper planned to abandon the ship and return home with his crew of four, according to word received here.

With telephone lines to West Point out of commission, details of the vessel's grounding were scant. Losing her way in a storm Monday, the schooner struck shortly after dark and Captain Duguay and the crew made shore safely in a lifeboat. It was learned.

The government lightship tender, Brant, steamed to West Point yesterday after word of the Alma's plight reached Summerside, but was unable to get close enough to the grounded vessel to be of any assistance.

The tender returned to Summerside late yesterday for more cable and left immediately to make an attempt to pull the schooner from her resting place on the sandy ledge.

Charlottetown marine officials reportedly understood efforts to re-float the Alma had been abandoned, and the Brant would sail for New Brunswick today with Captain Duguay and the crew of the ill-fated schooner.

Up to quite recently Mr. Simmonds had been in excellent health considering his advanced age and was able to attend the Exhibition. On Saturday evening, however, he became ill and was removed to the hospital, where he gradually grew weaker until he passed away.

He was born in Charlottetown, worked for a number of years at cabinet making in Boston and was engaged in farming at Marshfield. About ten years ago he retired from active work and has since been residing in this city.

He was a man of splendid character and enjoyed the respect and esteem of all who knew him. His wife predeceased him about two years ago. He leaves to mourn three sons, J. Percy in Charlottetown, Albert in Cleveland, Ohio, and George in Vancouver; and two daughters, Mrs. W. A. Miller, Charlottetown, and Mrs. Allison Holmes, Charlottetown. Royalty.

He also leaves two brothers, William in Los Angeles; George H. Simmonds, Spring Park, aged

87; and Mrs. Stair in New York, aged 92.

These are the only three survivors out of a family of fourteen.

A more than ordinary event took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John McLean, Flat River, on the evening of Monday, June 24th, when a very large number of relatives and friends assembled for the purpose of doing honor to Mr. McLean's father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Angus McLean, on the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding day.

The passing of little Albert Franklin Mills at the early age of fourteen months cast a gloom over the community of Marshfield and brought great grief to the home of the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lea Mills. The little fellow was a most attractive child, the only son and enjoyed good health until stricken with pneumonia. Milled medical attention and careful nursing for some time seemed about to be successful in restoring his health, but to the surprise and dismay of all, other complications developed and the lad was taken on July 23.

The funeral services were conducted at the home of his parents by Rev. G. A. Christie. The large attendance of friends and neighbors, the numerous floral gifts and letters of condolence manifested the deep sympathy of the community. The pall bearers were Borden Bzwell, Lorne Thompson, Eddie and Donald Mills. Interment was in the Central Church burying ground.
