

NEW BRUNSWICK FINANCIAL STATEMENT

FREDERICTON, N. B., Jan. 27.—A deficit of \$665,263 in New Brunswick's revenue account for the fiscal year ended October 31, 1932, is disclosed in the annual provincial financial statement. In the budget brought down last March a surplus of \$2,597 had been predicted. Total revenue for the year was \$5,735,630, as compared with expenditures of \$6,400,893. Receipts were \$14,284 lower than during the fiscal year 1931, but actual expenditures were reduced by \$400,527. Deficits in 1931 and 1930 were \$780,505 and \$635,129, respectively. Revenues received last year were almost a million dollars less than had been estimated by Hon. A. J. Leger, Provincial Secretary-treasurer in his budget address. He predicted an income of \$6,789,456. Expenditures, however, were \$425,966 less than had been anticipated. Approximately \$550,000 were slashed from controllable expenditures as compared with the previous year. The net debt of the province at the end of the fiscal year stood at \$4,942,178, an increase of \$1,741,343 over 1931. In 1931 there was an increase of \$3,960,315. Aside from the annual Dominion subsidy and allowances totalling \$1,397,387, the largest single revenue item was that of \$1,634,719, representing income derived under the motor vehicle law. This sum included \$835,604 for fees and \$795,739 for gasoline tax. These receipts were decidedly lower than had been expected. Net profits of the New Brunswick Liquor Control Board, estimated for the year at \$1,300,000, slumped to \$611,540, a decrease from 1931 and 1930. The Department of the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer produced a total of \$955,739, or \$192,971 less than anticipated in the estimates, but

IMPROVEMENT

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that of potatoes was much below normal. Potato prices, however, have been considerably higher than those received for the previous crop.

The Nova Scotia apple crop, originally estimated at 1,150,000 barrels, suffered a drop of about 40 per cent during the sales of September. A large proportion of these windfalls, however, were marketed at low prices. Owing to the depreciation of sterling in terms of the Canadian dollar, returns to the growers to date have been below expectations.

Fluctuations in sterling exchange are also of vital interest to the lumber industry. Competition in the United Kingdom from the Scandinavian countries, whose currencies bear a definite relation to sterling, and Russia, constitutes a serious problem, for, despite a drastic scaling down of costs, and a preference of 10 per cent in the British market, sales at the present prices bring no profit to the Maritime producer. The winter cut is thus likely to be somewhat smaller than that of last year.

Prices for dried fish have been slightly firmer during the past quarter, but are still unremunerative to the fishermen. The 1932 catch was small, and unless prices advance substantially, that of 1933 may be still smaller. The lobster catch so far has been fair.

Better Fox Fur Prices

Fox farmers in Prince Edward Island have experienced a satisfactory year, and current prices are somewhat higher than those of the previous season.

Activity in construction continues at a low ebb. The value of contracts awarded (according to MacLean's Building Reports, Limited, the source of all our figures of the value of contracts awarded) was \$9,340,000 during the past year as compared with \$16,867,000 in 1931.

Coal production in Nova Scotia during the first eleven months of 1932 had declined about 18 per cent as compared with the corresponding period of 1931. Steel production, in common with the experience of the steel industry the world over, is at a low level.

STORM

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ALONG N. S. COAST HALIFAX, Jan. 27 — (C. P.) — Mountainous waves leaped 50 feet up Chubasco Head tonight and silenced the great fog horn that had been warning ships of danger at the entrance of Halifax harbor during a terrific easterly gale.

Water poured into the engine room at the head and put the machines out of commission, according to a wireless message received by C. H. Hoesterman, district agent for the Marine Department.

Mr. Hoesterman said he could not remember a storm that silenced the fog horn before. Waters flooded cellars and streets. Fire department officials ordered all fires in homes near the shore drawn to prevent the possibilities of a conflagration.

The United States weather bureau said last night's storm had passed out to sea south of Nantucket but that another reported tonight in the vicinity of Norfolk, Va., and Washington, D. C., would strike here within the next 24 to 36 hours. Cloudy and some light snow tonight and tomorrow was the bureau's prediction.

Shipping was delayed by the high winds and rough seas while some vessels hove to until the high wind abated. The Cunard liner Franconia which was to pick up a party including Governor Joseph B. Ely at Boston for a West Indies cruise, turned back to New York.

Heavy Damage Reported LOCKEPORT, N. S., Jan. 27—(C.P.)—This town was an island tonight as a terrific easterly gale drove the sea over Crescent Beach and across the Isthmus.

Heavy damage was reported along the coast and fishermen suffered heavy losses as the waves carried away their gear and small boats. Two schooners were damaged when they were driven against wharves, and a loaded lobster car broke loose and drifted up on the shore. (Canadian Press)

HALIFAX, Jan. 27—A howling 70-mile gale out of the east lashed the coast of Nova Scotia today, paralyzing shipping and spreading destruction in coastal towns and villages.

Scores of small boats and wharves were carried away, two schooners were damaged and thousands of dollars worth of gear was lost by fishermen.

Big ships stood off the coast, awaiting a lull in the storm to enter Halifax and Yarmouth, and other vessels delayed sailing because of the high seas.

AYRSHIRE

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ure at the presence of Hon. Thomas McNutt, Minister of Agriculture, who was at the meeting, was expressed by the president.

Mr. B. R. Brown presented the treasurer's report. In his general report, Mr. Brown stated that in regard to the election of a Maritime director, the provincial association had supported Dr. L. A. Donovan, who was subsequently elected to the position. An acknowledgement of a vote of thanks from Mr. L. W. Roper, Live Stock promoter, was read.

Mr. Brown remarked that one of the clauses of the by-laws was that breeders should have herds tested once a year. There were 26 accredited herds in the Province. Many Ayrshire breeders were carrying on R. O. P. work. This was as it should be, as it was important that every breeder should have a record of his production. A large number of P. E. I. bulls had qualified under the R. O. P.

When Hon. Mr. Weir was in the Province last year, he had remarked to the speaker that not sufficient attention was being given to the Ayrshire breeders in Canada. Times had been hard, but the outlook was brightening, Mr. Brown believed.

Work Commended

Hon. Thomas MacNutt expressed his pleasure on being present at the meeting, and commended the work of the Ayrshire Breeders. The Ayrshire breed had a high standard in this Province. Mr. McNutt was glad to note the manner in which the meeting was being conducted. The dairying business was one of the most important branches of farming, the key industry. In the old days, potatoes and oats were disposed of at the merchant's price in the Fall. With the introduction of dairying, all had been changed. The Island might well place its faith in the future in the dairy industry, as cheese and butter were always necessities. Closely allied to the dairy industry was the pork industry. Canada supplied a very small quantity of the vast quantity of bacon consumed by Great Britain.

The speaker's advice to the farmers was to maintain the standard of the herd in order that when better times arrived, the breeders might be in a position to take full advantage of them. Present at the meeting was Mr. W. R. Shaw, who had the reputation of being one of the foremost livestock men in Canada, and who doubtless would be of great assistance to the breeders.

Mr. Major MacRae reporting for the picnic committee, that the picnic was a decided success, and was very enjoyable for all who attended.

Mr. Fred MacRae outlined changes which had been proposed by the parent organization for the Exhibition prize list. Much time was spent discussing this subject. A number of the recommendations were opposed by the meeting, but it was recommended that certain production standards be required of mature animals which were exhibited.

Mr. Major MacRae believed that the annual meeting should be held about the last of June, at the time of the annual picnic. The business meeting might be called in the morning and the picnic held in the afternoon. A larger number of members would probably be able to get together.

It was decided that the matter be left over for another year.

Bull Leaning

Mr. L. W. Roper, Live Stock promoter, reported that through the bull leaning association there were 27 registered bulls of R. O. P. quality at the head of 340 herds, representing 1,700 cows, throughout the Island. The desire for extension of this work had been expressed. The animals had been as a rule satisfactory, although a few replacements had been necessary. Among the Ayrshire breed no replacements had been made. The numerous calf clubs had done much good for the industry. The membership in these this year would be increased by one-third. Some herds had increased in quality 40 per cent. An Ayrshire Club at Birch Hill with a membership of twenty members had been organized. Mr. Roper stated that he had had correspondence with reliable Newfoundland merchants from whom very encouraging reports had come. New blood was necessary in the cattle industry there, and they thought that it would be well to send a man to this province, to look over some of the herds.

Major MacRae asked if Mr. Roper could go to Newfoundland with a view of stimulating the project. A motion was passed requesting the Department to send Mr. Roper to Newfoundland.

Mr. W. R. Shaw, Provincial Stock Superintendent, stated that the year 1932 was a period of low values in farm products. As regards the export market, Newfoundland had
