ORTIE McMANIGAL REPORTED MISSING

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 8.—Ortie McManigal, chief witness in the McNamara Dynamiting Cases, who has been confined in Los Angeles county jail for many months, is missing. It is reported he has been released and secretly sent out of town.

One of the jailers reported that McManigal left the prison about 9 o'clock yesterday morning in charge of Detective McLaren, of the District-Attorney's office.

District Attorney Fredericks is in hospital undergoing an operation, and cannot be interviewed. The Assistant District Attorney said that McManigal had not been released, but soon would be. McManigal has frequently been threatened with death.

WILL COMPEL ATTENDANCE AT NIGHT SCHOOLS

LONDON, April 8.—One of the principal features of the new Education Bill to be introduced during the present session of Parliament, it is understood, will be the establishment by local authorities of evening schools throughout the country and the compulsory attendance of children under sixteen years of age. The school age for the present day schools will be raised to fourteen years, so that for two years after leaving day school children will have the advantage of lessons in the evening.

To meet the objection that boys and girls at work during the day would be too tired to attend evening schools, the bill will limit the employment of young persons to probably 26 hours a week.

FIND METEORITE THAT FELL IN 1912

The cave is located in the mountains near Promontory Point, eighteen miles from Ogden, and has probably never been visited by white men, as the surrounding country is a bleak desert. The front chamber of the series is 75 by 150 yards, 41 ft. high and the walls bear pictures of Indians crudely drawn.

There is an Indian legend current in this locality to the effect that a great battle was fought years ago between two tribes near the point, the vanquished having perished in a mammoth cave.
