"Doris wouldn't come—she despises actors," Marianna demurred. "Besides, she's a bit out of patience with me just now. I refused to help her with her charity affair."

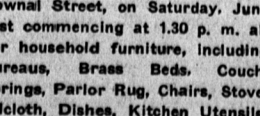

### Diverted Canal Reveals Old Chinese Burial Ground

SUCHIEN, China, June 17.—Discovery of about a dozen coffins in the bed of the Grand Canal, whose river bed here lately was diverted, has stirred the interest of scholars and has given rise to the belief that the famous waterway in the days of the Ming dynasty, when the coffins were buried, ran east of its present bed.

Three contained the bodies of the Giant family, Giang himself and his two wives, who had been buried here about 400 and 500 years ago. Inscriptions on a stone at the man's head gave Giang's name and a brief account of his family relating that he had died in the twelfth year of Djeng Del of the Ming dynasty, about 1514 A. D.

It is accepted that it was only by unexpected change that the resting places of persons of Giang's rank could come to be under the waters of the Grand Canal, and therefore it is believed that a century or so after these interments the course of the stream was changed into the channel it has followed in recent generations.

### UNITED STATES MISSIONARY ESCAPES FROM CHINESE PIRATES' STRONGHOLD

PEKING, June 17.—Rev. Ray, a United States missionary captured by river pirates in Kwangsi province late last month, has escaped from the mountain stronghold where he was taken, said advices received from the commander of the United States gunboat Pampana, sent to Wuchow in connection with the capture of Ray and P. G. Miller, a United States citizen, were released to take the pirates' demand for a heavy ransom to the captives' friends."

Ray's escape leaves E. H. Carne, an Australian, as the sole member of the party still held.

### Nippon Election Breaks Record for Money Spent

(United Press)

TOKIO, June 17.—The most expensive election in Japan's parliamentary history was that held this month to choose the 464 members of the House of Representatives. Estimates of the total expenditure of the candidates and parties, not including the necessary expenses of the government on election machinery, range between \$17,000,000 and \$22,000,000, with most of the estimates approaching the larger figure.

With more than 1,000 candidates in the field, it is estimated that each aspirant spent an average of \$20,000.

The contest for the Morioka seat, in which Korekiyo Takahashi, president of the Seiyukai party, defeated his Seiyuho rival, Ichimizu Tago, by a narrow margin of 49 votes, brought out the most lavish spending. Mr. Takahashi is believed to have spent nearly \$150,000, while his defeated rival disposed of about \$100,000.

In Tokio the largest amount was spent by the independent candidate Takagi, who got rid of \$50,000 and won. The average for each candidate in Tokio is placed at \$25,000. That money counted for a great deal is shown by the case of a candidate named Mori. He had only \$10,000 to spend and received only 30 votes to his successful rival's 3,000.

### Colonial Cotton Exported To Relieve British Deficit

(United Press)

LONDON, June 17.—In nearly every part of the British empire where cotton is grown conditions were satisfactory last year, according to the annual report of the British Cotton Growing Association.

It is generally admitted, says the report, that 1923 was one of the most unprofitable ever experienced in the history of the cotton milling industry in Great Britain, due to shortage of raw materials.

The great bulk of the mills using American cotton worked on short time, and the earning power of the operatives was seriously curtailed. This condition is being overcome by the increased production of the British colonies.

After detailing the progress made in cotton growing in various parts of the empire the report concludes: "The increased quantities of cotton produced during the year in many parts of the empire is very gratifying, especially at a time when the prospects for a greater production in America appear to be getting more remote every year. It cannot be denied that the cotton industry in Great Britain has been passing through the worst time it has experienced since the cotton famine, and there can be little doubt that the cost of cotton goods, largely due to the high price of the raw material, is responsible to a great extent for the poor demand from overseas markets. The world supply of useful cotton has been seriously curtailed as a result of the recent failures of the American crop, and with better trade conditions the demand for raw cotton would certainly have exceeded the supply."

### Hungry Jelly Fish Drive Herring From North Sea

(United Press)

BREMENHAVEN, June 17.—European ichthyologists have become greatly exercised by the diminished numbers of haddock and herring in the North Sea from which England, Holland, Germany and various other countries obtain their principal fish supplies, and several conferences have been held by those interested in the fish industry to consider what steps may be taken to remedy the situation. The herring began to disappear three years ago and the haddock some months later.

Fish experts attribute the diminished numbers of both herring and the haddock to the appearance in the North Sea of incredibly large schools of jelly fish and various forms of sea nettle which were swept in from the Atlantic ocean in 1920, when several changes were reported in the different Atlantic currents.

The jelly fish came in a flood of warm water and made themselves at home at once, consuming the food of the herring in such great amounts that the herring were unable to subsist. When they began to disappear the haddock too began gradually to diminish in numbers as it is upon the eggs of the herring that the haddock exists during a greater part of the year.

### Culion Leper Hospital Cures 300 Cases Yearly

(United Press)

MANILA, June 17.—The greatest problem now confronting the Philippine health authorities in the Culion leper colony is to keep the field already won so that the disease may be completely put under control, in the opinion of Dr. Victor G. Heiser, far eastern representative of the Rockefeller Foundation, who has just returned from an inspection of the Culion colony. Dr. Heiser at one time was director of health of the Philippines.

"This work can be done continuing annual appropriations from the legislature to carry out the task so well started," said Dr. Heiser. "The greatest danger is that some day the tax-payers may get tired of supporting the colony and drop it altogether. All the ground so far covered in the fight against the disease would be lost should the appropriations for support of the colony and the treatment of the lepers be cut off."

"The government spends annually about \$500,000 for leprosy work in the Philippines, the per capita cost being about 25 cents to the people of the islands. There are now 5,500 leper patients in Culion, and approximately 300 are cured every year under the new treatments. Of the newly arrived patients in Culion, 20 per cent recover and this proportion may be raised to 30 per cent should the present treatment be continued. The new treatments, the ethylester, the Mercado and Indian treatment, are employed according to each individual case."

### Germ of Hoof and Mouth Disease Reported Found

(United Press)

BERLIN, June 17.—Bacteriologists throughout Europe have been interested in the recent announcement here of the discovery of a bacillus capable of reproducing the hoof and mouth disease in animals. Specialists have come to Berlin to investigate further, while there have been many letters and cables from the United States and England, where there have been epidemics this spring. News of the discovery came from Professor Paul Frosch, of the Royal Veterinary College, who has been working on the problem several years in conjunction with Professor Dahmer.

The new bacillus has not yet been subjected to sufficient confirmatory tests to make it possible to say positively that it is the final solution of the difficulty, but medical journals in Germany and England have written enthusiastic articles about it and various authorities have ventured to predict that this enthusiasm has not been misplaced.

According to writers on veterinary subjects in these periodicals, the hoof and mouth disease is supposed to have been a European malady for more than 2,000 years, though it was not until the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries that positive proof of its presence was found.

### Mongolian Prince Opposes Invasion By Chinese Army

(United Press)

PEKING, June 16.—In spite of the resentment felt by the Mongolians toward their Russian masters, it is doubtful whether they would welcome release at the hands of the Chinese in the opinion of Prince Na, one of the senior Mongolian nobles who with nine other princes has become an exile rather than submit to Russian rule.

Na is more than 60 years of age. He was one of 24 princes who ruled one of the four provinces of Outer Mongolia before Baron Ungern-Sternberg and his "red" troops took possession of the country some five years ago. At that time the Russian invaders and their following of young Mongols gave the Mongol princes their option of submitting or leaving their country. Ten out of 83 chose exile.

They have been variously reported in circulation to the effect that the Chinese military authorities were considering plans for the recovery of Mongolia by means of an armed expedition. Interviewed on the subject Prince Na, who in the course of his long absence appears to have been in touch with events and conditions in his own country, expressed the opinion that such an effort would be ill advised. In the first place, he said, it is doubtful whether such an expedition could be successful, and in the second place it is an open question whether the Mongols themselves would welcome a Chinese army in their territory.

At present, the prince continued, the Living Buddha or Hutuktu, the head of the Mongol government, is in Urga. He is totally deaf, but in spite of his infirmity he, like all the minor officials throughout the country, is kept under close surveillance by the ussian rulers. Individual Mongols are forced to pay much heavier taxes than under their native princes. The Russian forces are not proportionally large, but their authority extends pretty

thoroughly over all the territory of Outer Mongolia.

Inner Mongolia remains loyal to the Chinese government, being designated as the Three Special Areas, Jehol, Chahar and Suiyuan. Prince Na felt that the present regime in Outer Mongolia could not survive, but he does not anticipate a resumption of authority by the old princes and the Hutuktu. That day has passed, he said, in its place he hoped for an eventual reorganization by the Mongols under the protection of the Chinese government.

Green Suede for Sport Wear

A short sport coat of delicate green suede has the collar and all the seams faced with throngs of green leather. The result is surprisingly like the work of the North American Indians.
