U. S. Labor Opposed To Seaway Project

NEW YORK, June 13 (AP) — Matthew Woll, vice president of the American Federation of Labor, today characterized the proposed St. Lawrence waterway and power project as the spending of "scores of millions of American dollars" to "bring Canadian labor" and "to give certain 'overwhelming majority' of A.F.L. members would oppose it."

In an address prepared for a luncheon meeting of a New York State conference in opposition to the waterway project, Mr. Woll said construction of the waterway would make possible shipment of British and Russian coal as ballast in foreign ships to Canadian ports and Great Lakes cities "to the detriment of American railroads and maritime labor, maritime industry and its workers and many communities."

Expect Service Vote On June 19

OTTAWA, June 13 (CP) — The result of the service vote in the Dominion general election will be announced June 19. The complete list of returns will be issued to the press and the same time telegrams will be forwarded to the returning officers of each constituency in Canada, giving the figures after the counting of the votes.

The vote in Canada is being counted in Halifax for the Middle West; Montreal for Quebec; Ottawa for Ontario; Edmonton for the Prairie Provinces and the Yukon and in Vancouver for British Columbia.

The overseas vote is being counted in London for the United Kingdom; somewhere in Belgium for the Canadian forces in Western Europe; Rome for the Italian theatre; Cairo for the Middle East; Bombay for India; Canberra for Australia; St. John's for Newfoundland; and Kingston, Jamaica, for the West Indies.

Prime Minister King Leads By 228 Votes

OTTAWA, June 13 (CP) — Prime Minister Mackenzie King today led his C.C.F. opponent, W. L. Bowerman, in the Alberta constituency by 228 votes on the basis of civilian returns in Monday's Dominion election.

Mr. King's majority was based on reports from 167 of the 182 polls which gave him a total of 77,351 votes against Mr. Bowerman. Two other candidates trailed, Sqn. Ldr. W. Nelson, Progressive Conservative, 45 and J. N. Hincemman, Social Credit, 77.

ONTARIO SERVICE VOTE

TORONTO, June 13 (CP) — Major Alex Lewis, chief election officer for Ontario, said today he expects to be able to announce next Tuesday the result of the service vote in the June 4 Ont. general election. Servicemen at home and overseas voted May 30 to June 4.

Captured German War Equipment Poses Problem

LOS ANGELES, June 13 (AP) — The Allies are facing a problem of millions of tons of captured German armament and ammunition.

So far no satisfactory solution has been reached by the army of the military government, which are expediting reports from the 21st Army Group indicate that considerable amounts of German armament collected so far has been tagged for use against Japan.

Huge dumps of tanks, guns and other armament which are scattered up and down the length and breadth of the Reich can be disposed of in the course of time as scrap metal, but the stocks of ammunition and high explosives fall into an entirely different category.

The following are among the awards announced in the King's birthday honors list yesterday:

To be additional Officer of the Military Division of the British Empire (O.B.E.):

Acting Commander Harry Freeland, D.S.O., R.C.N.R., Charlottetown, P.E.I. (also Sydney, N.S.)

"This Officer (says the citation) has served continuously at sea for the past five years, and has been in command since the spring of 1940. He has at all times, and often in the presence of the enemy, proven a cool and capable leader, and by consistently displaying outstanding qualities of loyalty to duty, he has set an example to others in keeping with the highest traditions of the Royal Canadian Navy."

Commander Freeland was granted the D.S.O. on June 29, 1943. His wife, Mrs. Natalie G. Freeland, resides at 217 Weymouth Street, Charlottetown.

Famous Island Officer Home

LT.-COL. REID, D.S.O.

One of the Province's most distinguished and popular army officers, Lt.-Colonel W. W. Reid, D.S.O., arrived home from France yesterday by plane, and is expected to arrive in Charlottetown on Tuesday at 3:30 P.M. (11:30 A.M. A.D.T.)

Reid was in command of the 2nd Battalion of the 1st Canadian Infantry Division in the Pacific theatre, and was awarded the D.S.O. for his gallant and distinguished service in the capture of the island of Guadalcanal in the Solomon Islands.

British Empire Bore Brunt Of Shipping Losses

LOS ANGELES, June 13 (CP) — The British Empire lost more than half of the total Allied and neutral merchant shipping sunk during the war from 1939 to May 8, 1945, according to a joint Anglo-American statement disclosed today.

Britain lost 2,570 ships of the total Allied and neutral loss of 4,770. Of the total tonnage of 17,500,000 tons of merchant shipping which she began the war, she built 4,500,000 tons of new shipping.

The fact that the British Empire possessed a large original tonnage and by conducting an intensive building program managed to maintain a large merchant fleet at sea was responsible to a large degree for Germany's final defeat, the British information services said.

Canada's Army Leader For Far East Is Home

OTTAWA, June 13 (CP) — Canada's Pacific 6th Division may possibly be supplied by volunteers from forces now in Britain and continental Europe, Maj.-Gen. Bert M. Hoffmeister of Vancouver said tonight.

The tall, heavily-built general just arrived from overseas by plane, stuck his thumbs into his black belt and told a press conference that 20,000 men in the western European theatre and another 7,500 in Britain had volunteered to serve in his force.

595 Canadian Service Personnel On Honors List

OTTAWA, June 13 — Five hundred and ninety five men and women who have served with Canadian armed forces, merchant marine and fishing fleets were included in the King's birthday honors list that reflected past achievement and efficient groundwork laid for the future.

There were 44 women in the list, which was made up of 136 honorees for the Navy, 132 for the Army, 266 for the R.O.A.F., nine for the merchant navy and 10 for the fishing fleet.

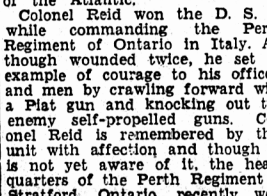

Temperature Up To 80 Yesterday

The temperature went to 80 degrees above zero yesterday, the highest recorded this season. Meanwhile it was learned that some damage had been caused by heavy frost last Friday night and early Saturday morning. Early potatoes were burned and from some sections, especially the Orwell Cove area, clover fields were reported to have been damaged.

Mr. Warren Burns, weather observer at the Charlottetown Experimental Station said that the air temperature that night had remained at 33 above and that it was unlikely that apple blossoms would be affected. However, seven degrees of frost were recorded on the ground. It was not known yet what effect the frost would have on strawberries and on the wild berry crop, notably blueberries.
