Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years of age, who has been a resident of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency that has a Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

which proves that good talent will bring large audiences regardless of conditions. The new piano, electric lights, footlights, etc., gave the C. M. B. A. hall a bizarre appearance, which probably had an unconscious effect on the audience. Rev. P. C. Gauthier of Palmer Road, who delivered the address, probably surprised his already well known reputation as an orator. Father Gauthier endeavored himself more than ever to the people of Kensington by his eloquence and broad-minded assertions. That beautiful dream, the absolute "brotherhood of man," will more nearly become an entity when more men of Father Gauthier's calibre are educating the masses. The lecturer dwelt at length upon the life and labors of the beloved St. Patrick. His life work of Christianizing the then pagan Ireland, of how, when nearly all Europe was over run by the savage hordes of both, free land alone had the strength to drive them from her shores, retain her faith, civilization, and refinement, and after the wave of paganism had spent its force, to send emissaries to other parts of the then known world to teach the words of the Prince of Peace. The lecturer made a particular point of the improved condition of Ireland, and the Irish people in very recent years. He quoted statistics to show that less than one hundred years ago the vast majority of the land in Ireland was owned by seven hundred tenants. The people of Ireland are now a contented people. Home Rule is on the statute books. The embryo of be-

tween the people of the north and south of Ireland, previous to the war, was fostered by Germany. To think that men who had fought and bled together in the trenches of France and Belgium, against the common enemy, would start an internecine war, was incomprehensible. Lord Kitchener asked Redmond for 20,000 men, Ireland sent 100,000 men. Ireland will have a responsible, autonomous government, the same as Canada, and Ireland will yet take her place as the "first gem of the ocean."

The Boys' Flag Drill, instituted by Miss Squarebriggs, principal of Kensington High school, was executed with military precision, and elicited favorable applause. The chorus by the Kensington quartette made a fine impression. J. Austin Trainor of Charlottetown, made a hit with "The hat My Father Wore Upon St. Patrick's Day. Austin has established himself in Kensington as a comedian of the first water.

Mr. Scantlebury of Charlottetown, as an Indian club swinger, gymnast, and equilibrist, has not been equalled in Kensington. Mr. Walter Found, of Clifton, who sang, "A Little Bit of Heaven, Shure they Call it Ireland," has a beautiful tenor voice and had to respond to the second encore. Mr. Found is always popular.
