TOKYO ISSUES NEW PANAY STATEMENT

TOKYO, Dec. 22-Japan admitted today "there might have been stray bullets" flying toward the United States gunboat Panay after she was bombed by Japanese aircraft, but said the vessel was not machine-gunned intentionally.

The new statement on the Panay incident was contained in an "interim report" issued by the Foreign Office. Previously the Japanese had denied reports by American eyewitnesses that surface boats had fired on the Panay.

The Foreign Office declined to say whether the "interim report" would serve as a reply or as a basis for a reply to United States notes protesting the Panay attack, but said "investigations still are progressing."

JAPS ADVANCE

ering stiff resistance in the vicinity of Wukang, but that Japanese armored trains had advanced to within 16 miles of the city along the Shanghai-Hangchow railway. Japanese said approximately 100,000 Chinese troops were in the Hangchow-Kashing area. Reports that the Japanese were massing troops for an attack on Canton, South China metropolis, increased the evacuation of natives to enormous proportions. Thousands fled westward into the interior and toward Hong Kong. Unverified reports said Japanese attempted to land forces in Blas Bay, northeast of Hong Kong, but were beaten off and now were planning a second attempt.

Drop Recorded In Fur Prices

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) EDMONTON, Dec. 22-Prices 20 to 25 per cent below those of a year ago were recorded today at the annual fur auction of the Edmonton Fur Auction Sales Limited, Manager Levine reported. "The reason for the general price drop in furs this year, he said, "is due to general business depression and unsettled politics. It is not due to inferior grades of skins from the north." The auction saw a turnover of between \$30,000 and \$35,000 worth of fox and beaver skins and between \$50,000 and \$55,000 worth of skins of marten, mink and ermine, wolf and muskrat.

Nazis Celebrate Christmas Early

(By The Associated Press) BERLIN, Dec. 22-The Reich capital and other cities through Germany observed in the early morning hours today what might be termed a substitute for Christian Christmas celebration. Winter solstice exercises were conducted by the Brown-shirted S. (Storm Troops). At one observance at the foot of Kreuzberg, Berlin's only hill, the names were read of Nazis who fell in Berlin during pre-Nazi fights for control of the Government. For each name the SA responded "here" in chorus. The group leader then admonished all to take fresh strength for tasks of the coming year, a bonfire was lighted and Nazi songs were sung. A wreath for each fallen comrade was tossed into the flames. The ceremony closed with a renewed pledge of fidelity to Chancellor Hitler.
