War Has Lost Its Glamor, Taking On Chemical Aspect

This Growing Realization, Hardens Terms Greatest Gain of Conflict

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., August 5.—A symposium on "What did the world gain by the World War?" is published today by the American Legion Weekly. The majority of the replies agree that there were gains, though some deny any.

The first person quoted, the former Kaiser's secretary, Admiral H. von Reber-Paschwitz said: "What did the world gain? Nothing! It lost everything."

"This answer," said the article, "was in reply to a letter to William Hohenzollern," in Holland. It is taken to represent very closely the real views of the former Emperor.

"The symposium was prepared to feature the tenth anniversary of the beginning of the World War."

DICTATORS' ERA

Frederich Wilhelm, former Crown Prince, says: "The result was that all nations are arming as hard as they can, and what about democracy? Just look at the cables from over the whole world. Dictatorship of some sort or other is the favorite idea. The only good the war did is to show that a nation, not well armed, is powerless, and that such a nation gets no help from anybody."

Sir Arthur W. Currie, commander-in-chief of the Canadian expeditionary forces: "By the World War we gained a truer appreciation and a better realization of the war's unseemable waste, its dreadful hardships, its cruel slaughter and its aftermath of loneliness, sorrow and broken hearts. We now know that as a means of solving the world's problems and removing international discord war is a delusion and a lie."

General John J. Pershing, commander of the United States expeditionary forces: "While we are probably too close to the events of the World War definitely to judge of its general benefits to mankind, yet the victory should result in preventing domination by autocracy with all its disastrous effects upon civilization, and the evidence is clear, that the free peoples of the world will unite in resisting such domination."

VALOR OF YOUTH

Sir Philip Gibbs, British war correspondent: "The only gain to humanity from the World War, as far as I can see now, was the inspiration that comes from the supreme valor of youth and its ready sacrifice for ideals higher than self-interest."

Germany Still Opposes Foreign Automobiles

(Associated Press)

BERLIN, Aug. 5.—American automobile interests have taken account of a fight which developed here recently between the German Association of Automobile Dealers, which favors removal of government restrictions against cars of all kinds, and the German manufacturers who desire to keep the prohibitions effective because of the protection they provide their industries. The import restrictions are of particular importance to manufacturers in the United States, as they curtail the sale of American cars in Germany to a considerable extent.

According to a report to the United States Department of Commerce made by Fayette W. Allport, trade commissioner in charge of the American embassy in Berlin, two major problems must be solved before the German market can possibly open its doors to the cars from the other side of the Atlantic, the first being the import prohibition and the second the problem of finance. Arrangements have already been made in the United States, the report says, through three different channels to finance transactions whereby about 1,000 cars a month would be shipped to Germany, this number being considered sufficient to meet normal requirements for the time being.

It has been estimated that with the import restrictions lifted, and by paying a reasonable duty, American cars could be sold here for from 20 to 30 percent cheaper than the price charged for automobiles manufactured in Germany today under the prevailing conditions and high prices.

But the prospects for the removal of the present restrictions are not encouraging.

Gained Son's Release After Sixteen Years

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 5.—An aged mother from the Tennessee mountains has won a battle that she has fought single-handed against the powers of the state for the last 16 years. Her plea that her son, a prisoner in the state penitentiary here, be pardoned, was granted recently.

Mrs. Sam Hatfield, 63, the mother, appeared before the parole board and addressed Governor Austin Peay as "son" and the members of the parole board as "children."

Her son, Lon Hatfield, was convicted in 1908 for the murder of a minister. The sole tangible evidence was a twenty dollar gold piece, said to have belonged to the minister, which was found in Hatfield's pocket after the murder. Hatfield declared that the coin belonged to him but the jury rejected this claim and convicted him on circumstantial evidence. Immediately after sentence was passed on her son, the mother began her battle for his freedom. She sold her little farm and during the last 16 years she has made at least fifty trips to the penitentiary to present her plea to the authorities and to see her son.

At last, she obtained from both the trial judge and the prosecuting attorney requests that Lon Hatfield be pardoned. These requests were joined by the widow of the slain minister.

Mrs. Hatfield was told by Governor Peay that he would make her a Christmas present of her son.
