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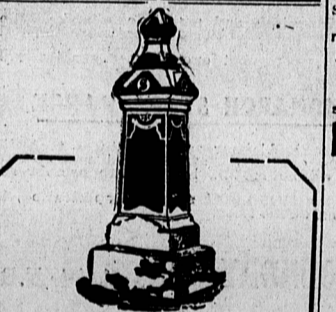

BISLEY, July 12—Corporal Mortimer, of Quebec, has continued his success for the opening day by securing the fifth place in the Edge and the Halford Memorial competitions, winning forty shillings in each case. The Edge is a squadded competition in the Hopton Aggregate, prizes fifty pounds, given by T. L. K. Edge, to be shot for at distances of nine, ten and eleven hundred yards. The Halford Memorial Challenge Cup is a squadded competition in the Hopton Aggregate series, open, like the Edge, to all corners, the prizes being the cup and fifty pounds, and the distance a thousand and eleven hundred yards.

Lord Chylesmere the president of the National Rifle Association, has arranged for a Bisley competition in which the Canadian and other cadets may participate. They have now reached the ranges the following Canadian marksmen who are unattached to the representative team—Major Hart McHarg, Col. Stuart, Col-Sergt. Hunter, Private Warden, Vancouver; Capt. Wolfenden, B. C.; Capt. Dover, Toronto; Staff-Sergt. Richardson, Victoria; Sergt. White and Sergt. Cliffe, Toronto; Lieut. Blackburn and Sergt. Forbes Clark, Winnipeg; and Sergt. Peter Armstrong.

Sergt. G. W. Russell, of the Governor-General's Foot Guards, Ottawa, took the first place in the 200 yards sweepstakes today, winning sixty shillings. The following Canadians were also winners in the same sweepstake. Pte Bibby, Dundas, fourth; Sergt. Patterson, Ottawa, ninth; and Blackburn, fourteenth, each winning twenty shillings. Private Bibby was second in the 300 yards sweepstake, winning sixty shillings.

DIVORCES RAW FOOD HUSBAND

PITTSFIELD, July 11—In the Superior Court this morning Mrs. Lucy E. Tyler, a Haverhill dressmaker, was granted a divorce from Albert F. Tyler of this city on grounds of desertion. She was also awarded alimony in the sum of \$800. This case attracted considerable attention last February, when the Post published a story about Tyler and how he got his ideas. The article came to the attention of Mrs. Tyler, who, it is said, had seen or heard nothing of her husband in eight years. She came to this city and he had married another woman and was the father of three children by her. Tyler at that time was advocating raw food as a diet and despite the intense cold allowed no fires in his house.

In court today Mrs. Tyler No. 1 testified that she was formerly Miss Lucy Silloway of Exeter, N. H., and that she was married to Tyler in South Boston on March 18, 1894. He was a vender of essences and with him that year she made a wagon trip across the continent peddling essences. Afterward she made a trip with him to Alabama. They Tyler disappeared and she heard nothing from him until February. Her testimony was corroborated by her sister, Miss Ella Silloway, of Kingston, W. H. Tyler's father, Roland Tyler, of Exeter, and John P. Prescott, also of Exeter. Mrs. Tyler will resume her maiden name and at the expiration of two years, when the decree becomes absolute for Tyler, he will remarry his second wife, who has lived apart from him since the divorce suit was begun.

THE HOUSE OF LORDS AND THE VETO BILL.

LONDON, July 14—The House of Lords yesterday concluded the report stage of the veto bill and fixed July 20th as the date for the third reading. It seems certain the bill will go to the House of Commons with considerable changes made by Lord Lansdowne and Lord Cromer unmodified. Premier Asquith will move the rejection of the amendments en bloc will state what the Government intends to do with respect to securing the creation of new peers to overcome the opposition in case the Lords reject the bill.

THE DISASTER IN PORCUPINE DISTRICT.

TORONTO, July 14—A conservative estimate of the number of dead in the Porcupine fire disaster is 200. The number may run to 500 and a few excited refugees mention even 1,000. Eighty-eight names have been recorded of persons known to be dead. The fact that the total fire area covered thousands of square miles and that there were 20,000 people in that area renders estimates little better than guess work. The loss of life will never be accurately known. News coming in of the calamity makes 200 look like a very low estimate.

STRIKE IN SPAIN ASSUMES A SERIOUS CHARACTER

SARAGOSSA, Spain, July 14—The general working men's strike recently proclaimed here is assuming a serious character. Yesterday the civil guard charged and fired upon a mob killing five persons and wounding many others. Two thousand workers are out.

MINING EXCHANGES ARE CLOSED.

MONTRAL, July 14—Owing to the Porcupine disaster the Montreal and Toronto Mining Exchanges were closed today and the Toronto exchange will not be opened until Monday.
