THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

NEW LONDON RAILWAY.

SIR,—I see by a report of the Stanley Bridge Railway meeting that no mention was made of including French River in the proposed loop line of railway. Hon. Geo. Simpson our local member side-tracked us and proposing a line from Blue Shank through Clifton and Stanley to Milton and another gentleman intimating that a line to Stanley without including Clifton would be opposed. Now Mr. Editor we can assure the promoters that any line that does not tap French River, the fish and lobster centre of New London, will be strongly opposed. We are prepared to show that a line of railway can be located on a nearly level and an almost straight line from Kensington through a farming section not excelled on even P. E. I., that a bridge over the South West River could be constructed and the line pass near Clifton and through Stanley at, at least, as small a cost as through the very hilly country from Blue Shank. Some few years ago the Dominion Government dredged out French River at a cost of about \$15,000 and many said it would be a useless expenditure. At that time we had but one schooner owned here and our valuable fishing was almost given up. Now although the harbor is bad and in need of breakwaters to improve it, we have eight schooners owned in this river, six of those fishermen, who land about 200 blis salt mackerel each, per season beside large quantities of fresh mackerel and cod fish. In the near vicinity are located four lobster factories shipping about 1800 cases per season, one cheese and butter factory, several steam and water-power grist and saw mills, one of which is fitted with best improved roller process and does a large shipping trade, also one general store doing a large business. All supplies for these industries have to be hauled from Kensington, 83 miles and the product hauled back. Sorry to take up so much of your valuable space and may in a future letter speak of what could be done right here in a cod and fresh mackerel fleet as per Mr. Messervey's timely suggestions.

THE EMPIRE EXTENSION.

Thrilling Tale of How British Supremacy Was Maintained Against Overwhelming Odds by West African Pioneers.

Mr. C. Braithwaite Wallis, late Acting District Commissioner of the Sierra Leone Protectorate, tells a story of heroism, resource and administrative genius equalled by few chapters in the history of the Empire, and the stirring events which it details took place no further back than 1895.

It was in that year that the recently formed Protectorate over Sierra Leone and the Hinterland or back country of West Africa was convulsed by an insurrection of the native races, who refused to pay the very moderate and reasonable hut-tax imposed by the Government.

It was a crisis in our Imperial history resembling in its tragic episodes the horrors of the Indian mutiny, and it was here in the pestilential swamps of West Africa, at 1895, and a part of the year succeeding, handful of British troops fought grimly to maintain the supremacy of the old flag, many gallant officers and men losing their lives either by the bullets and spears of the savages or by that scourge of this tropical country—the deadly malaria.

Here some of the most treacherous and horrible murders recorded in history occurred, preceded by diabolical tortures which the depraved mind of the African bush savage only could conceive.

Most impressive is the sublime audacity and the iron nerve of those young Englishmen, who, as district commissioners, had to uphold the authority of the Government. The author describes one typical scene in which the commissioner of the Karene district calls a "palaver."

This man was in a district seething with rebellion, and had with him but a small battalion of Hausas. Yet when the chief came at his summons with 1,000 followers, while 2,000 of his people waited outside the town watching the turn of events, the commissioner spoke as if he had a British army behind his back, and when the chiefs refused compliance with his commands, he actually arrested them, and sentenced them to varying terms of imprisonment with hard labor. And remarkable is it to learn that his stern courage won the natives of the district into submission.

One of the most exciting and heroic episodes of this "little war" was the defence of Kambia by Commissioner Braithwaite Wallis himself, who narrates his adventures with becoming modesty but no lack of vigor.

The total strength of fighting men was one sergeant, one lance-corporal, and 25 privates, or 28 in all, including Commissioner Wallis. This little band of heroes was attacked by vast hordes of blacks on three sides at once, and as hour after hour went by one by one dropped dead under the hail of fire poured into the stockade. It was only a remnant that escaped by boat when complete annihilation was near at hand.
