Bonar Law May Be Next Premier

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Oct 11—Lloyd George means to fight—and to fight his hardest. He may quit office in the end but he will not be kicked out. That is the meaning of his latest moves, namely, his disclosure of the fitness of the labor leaders in their conference with him at Downing Street in September. In the Near East policy another move is his sudden arrangement for a meeting at the reform club in Manchester on Saturday to 'talk back' at all his enemies. It is widely believed that he is ready to renew his offer to make war in the premiership for Austen Chamberlain or Andrew Bonar Law. Chamberlain and the other unionist leaders realize however, that if Lloyd George falls on the ground of his policy they fall also, for his policy has been theirs.
