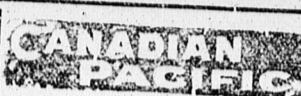

CANADA'S MILEAGE AND DEMAND FOR CARS.

The Dominion Has More Than 26,000 Miles of Railway Track in Operation.—The Demand For Cars.

The increase of railway mileage in Canada is one of the notable features in the development of the Dominion. This mileage is ten times greater than it was four decades ago. In the ten years between 1870 and 1880 the mileage has increased from 2617 to 6858, in the next ten years from 2617 to 13,151. By the end of 1909 the railway builders of Canada had added 4,506 more to the country's mileage, and the official records show that in 1904 this had increased to 19,000 miles.
Four years later the mileage was 22,966 and on June 30th, 1909, the total was 26,330, including 1590 miles officially regarded as "under construction," but actually in operation.

During these years the increase has averaged 600 miles annually.

INCREASE OF TRADE ALL IN THE IMPORTS.

OTTAWA, Jan 24.—During the first nine months of the present year Canada's total trade amounted to \$577,999,628, an increase of \$65,511,359 compared with April to Dec 1909. The increase was entirely in imports, owing to the rapid development of the country and the growing demands of home market.

UNIVERSAL PEACE A LONG WAY OFF

(Continued from page 1.)
tifying the canal, so that the United States had every right and reason to protect what was purely an American waterway.

The president said he yielded to no man in his love of peace and hatred of war. He said he hoped to submit soon to the senate arbitration treaties of a broader nature than had ever come before that body or any other legislative body of the world. At the same time Mr. Taft called on his hearers to remember that universal peace was still a long way off and he could not conceive of any patriotic American being willing to allow an attacking force free and equal use of a waterway which was built by Americans largely as an instrument for the defence of their country.

It was Mr. Taft's trip under the North river, through the new Pennsylvania tubes as well as in the huge new station at 7th avenue.
At the conclusion of his address to the Pennsylvania society he looked in at the annual dinner of the New York Press club at the Hotel Martinique, and made a second address, this time informal, then hurried to his train.
The president recalled that the Clayton-Bulwer treaty of 1850 was made with Great Britain at a time when neither country contemplated building a canal. After the failure of the French competition he recalled, came the Spanish-American war, and the 12,000 mile cruise of the Oregon demonstrated the necessity for the canal to double the efficiency of the United States fleet. He quoted at length from the correspondence between John Hay and Lord Lansdowne, in support of his proposition that nothing in the Hay-Panama treaty precluded the right of the United States to fortify the canal.

"Suppose," said the president "that England is at war with some other country that is not bound to us by treaty rights at all, isn't it essential that we should have fortifications there to protect the canal, not only for our own use and for the world's commerce, but for the use of England and her warships as a means to preserve that canal as a means of transit to her transports in time of war as long as we are ourselves not engaged in the controversy?"

It was interesting to watch the face of Andrew Carnegie as the president warmed to his argument and hammered home his points.

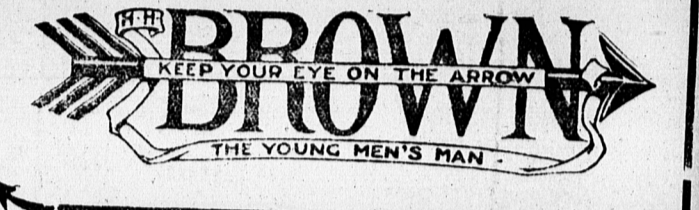
