WILL HELP FIGHT THE WHITE PLAGUE

TORONTO, Nov. 30.—The Duke of Connaught has accepted the honorary presidency of the National Sanatorium Association, and has expressed warm interest in the work undertaken by the association.

The duke and duchess will today, conclude their Toronto visit with a busy program fully in keeping with the arduous pace they have set in their two days' stay, the schools of the city and tonight the royal party will leave for Hamilton.

Yesterday's program was a strenuous one which kept the royal visitors busy from early morning, until long after midnight. The Duke began his day with an early morning walk, after which he was closeted for a business session with his secretary Colonel Lowther. At eleven o'clock their royal highness proceeded to the Carnegie library to visit the exhibition of the Royal Canadian Academy where they admired the fine display of paintings and met many of the artists.

At noon the duke and duchess reached Convocation Hall the university where, in the presence of a distinguished gathering of educationalists and a crowd of cheering students, the duke was made an LL.D.

At three o'clock the royal party visited Upper Canada College where the head boy presented an address and a junior pupil handed a bouquet to the duchess. The duke asked Principal Addison to give the boys a whole holiday, which was granted.

From the college the duchess went to the Victoria Hospital for sick children, where she visited every ward and spoke to a majority of the accompanied by the lieutenant-governor little patients. Meanwhile the duke hurried to the King Edward where an informal reception was held under the auspices of the Toronto Press Club. The duke spoke briefly to the newspapermen, laying stress upon the regrettable prevalence of slipshod English in the newspapers, especially upon the sporting pages.

"May I give a word of advice to the editors?" asked His Royal Highness. "May I advise them to see that those under them are more careful in the choice of the English that they use?"

At 10.30, last night their Royal Highness opened the magnificent ball given at the Armories by the Royal Canadian Yacht Club. The ball, which was the most brilliant social event in the history of the city, was attended by more than 2500 persons.

KINGSTON, Nov. 30.—It will be an official visit that the Duke and Duchess of Connaught will pay to Kingston on Saturday, but in the three hours they will remain in the city, they will have much to occupy their attention. They will make a thorough inspection of the Royal Military College buildings, and see the cadets at work.

A PLEA FOR BIG BUSINESS INTERESTS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Elbert H. Gary, executive head of the United States Steel Corporation, made a plea for "big business" yesterday before the Senate Committee on Interstate Commerce, which is searching for a solution of the present trust problem in the United States.

Big corporations are essential to the development of the country and the maintenance of business prosperity, he said. To prevent the enormous power that comes with wealth and control of industrial agencies, he thought the government should take control of them, through a corporation of trade commission, with absolute power to regulate their affairs. Add to this a clear law as to what can and what cannot be done, the strong light of publicity on all the affairs of corporations, and the elimination of presidential and other political issues from the business world, and the "unrest" that has spread over the United States will largely disappear, said Mr. Gary.

The coming election is already disturbing business, he added. He said members of the courts ought to be appointed for life, that the President ought to be elected for eight years without the privilege of re-election, that he would be in a "position and frame of mind" where he would not be tempted to "look in any direction or toward any interests" in seeking re-election.

Mr. Gary dwelt at length upon the political situation. He said he had no particular President in mind, but he believed that fewer elections and less reason for seeking public or private support for political purposes would aid greatly in keeping business at a level. At the present time, he said,

there was a great curtailment of business activity because of the approaching election.

BARONETS ODD JOBS.

A New Zealand paper has discovered that there are five baronets living in that Dominion. In all the Britains mostly in very humble walks of life, beyond the seas there are baronets. It will be remembered that the sensational murder at Monte Carlo revealed the existence of the holder of an ancient joint baronetcy working as a railway porter in South Australia. In Melbourne a few years ago the holder of an historic English baronetcy was earning his living as a post office letter carrier. Of the five New Zealand baronets only one—Sir George Clifford—is a man of wealth. The other four are civil servant, solicitor, dentist and land agent. None of them is "spurious." They are all to be found in Dod and Debrett.

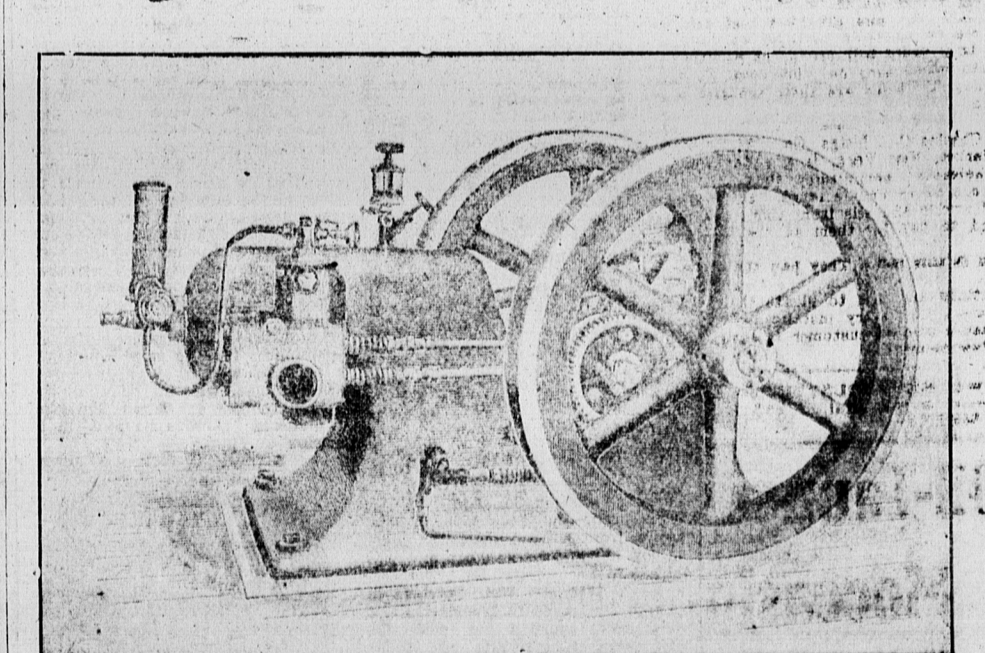
