Add to brotherly kindness charity, the capstone of the magnificent building, built not on the treacherous quicksands for the sake of worldly reputation, but built on the solid rock, that shall stand the storms of time and last throughout eternity, not erected for the eye of man, but for the eye of God. We also were greatly blessed and cheered by two solos by Bro. Hugh McLean "He Redeemed me" and "Building for Eternity". His sweet musical tones touched the heart of all present. Bro. Malcolm A.
