It was Mr. Percy Bowness' valuable racing horse they were driving and the water at the spot, near the Bedeque shore, was about twelve feet deep. As there was no chance of extricating the animal without assistance, Mr. McEachern volunteered to hold its head above water whilst Mr. Wood went for help. This he did for about half an hour, until the arrival of Mr. Lord who lives nearby and other helpers including a party passing on the ice in an auto. By the aid of chains passed under the ani-

mal they were able to lift it bodily on to the ice. The sleigh was also recovered, but all Mr. McEachern's samples of dry and sporting goods were ruined. He also lost a \$10 bill that fell out of his pocket as he was taking out his knife to cut the harness. The horse was taken to Mr. Lord's barn, thoroughly rubbed down and blanketed and a few hours later was brought home apparently none the worse. So the adventure ended far more happily than it might have done for all concerned. The incident, however, should serve as a warning to all that the ice is none too safe and that every precaution should be used by those travelling on it. Mr. Percy Bowness passed over the same spot only a few days ago with his heavy motor-horse.—S.

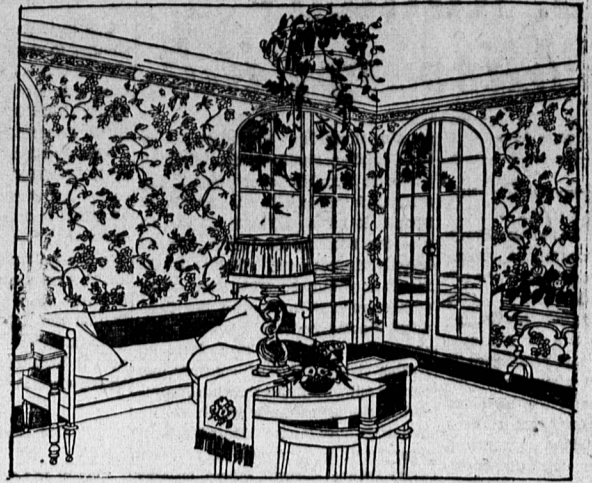
