First Out, First In For Air Reservists

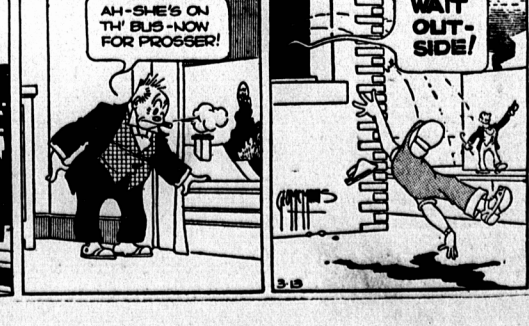
