"The threatening attitude of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association and the certainty that, in face of this opposition, the International Paper Company cannot join with the Canadian manufacturers in raising the price to \$80 are said to be the factors influencing members of the Institute."

MONTREAL, Dec. 12.—"I have heard of no such conference and am not aware of any alteration in the attitude of the Canadian newsprint manufacturers." This was the comment this evening of P. B. Wilson, chief executive officer of the Canadian Newsprint Institute, when shown a Toronto Star despatch to the effect that Canadian manufacturers following an informal conference here today, with Premier Taschereau, of Quebec, had practically acknowledged that they felt it would be impossible to raise the price of newsprint to \$80 a ton in the face of the strong opposition from American publishers.

Maritime Prov. Club of Montreal Aids Tourist Plan

MONTREAL, Dec. 12.—At the conclusion of the deliberations of the newly-constituted Canadian Association of Tourist and Publicity, Bureau in the Mount Royal Hotel, Montreal, this week a group of the Maritime delegates was invited to a conference with executives of the Maritime Provinces Club in the Club's suite Windsor Hotel, where W. B. MacCoy, the secretary, acted as chairman.

Those present included Hon. Mr. Justice Arsenault, of Charlottetown, president-elect of the National Tourist Bureau; C. B. Foster, passenger traffic agent of the C. P. R. and one of the vice-presidents of the Maritime Provinces Club; C. K. Howard, superintendent of the Tourist and Convention Bureau of the Canadian National Railways; Senator Hance J. Logan, Principal Atkinson of the West Hill High School, Montreal; J. A. Wisely, stock broker; J. D. Black, director of the New Brunswick Government Bureau of Publicity and Tourist Trade, Fredericton, N. B.; W. H. Golding, secretary, Saint John Tourist Association; R. H. Coats of the Bureau of Statistics, Ottawa, and others.

OFFER SERVICES.

Mr. McCoy said he felt the time opportune to place the services of the Maritime Provinces Club at the disposal of the tourist offices of the Maritime Provinces and desire to have an informal discussion of the matter. Among the ideas put forth was that of incorporating with the Club's suite a bureau for the distribution of Maritime tourists' printed matter including maps and route guides. An illuminated wall-map on a large scale specially painted and annotated with building signs and tourist information was also thought to be a good scheme.

chanising farm labor in the West, the problem of employment as it affects agriculture will have to be seriously reconsidered, he continued. Over \$80,000,000 is being spent annually in the Prairie Provinces on farm machinery and the great ploy of it is that from 75 to 90 percent of that machinery is made in the United States. When I travel back to Winnipeg why do I have to cross through United States territory, why can't the Federal Government commence the building of roads connecting Eastern Canada with the west? Before the war the Canadian Government spent millions in railway construction in the West. Why can't they now, when we are so much more prosperous, start a gigantic scheme of road construction, which would bring a wave of prosperity in all industries and relieve the unemployment situation. If we bring people to this country we must be prepared to give them work 300 days in the year not three months, said Col. Webb.

ister of Railways and Canals some time before Parliament meets, is now practically a certainty. The portfolio has been offered to him and he has accepted. He will shortly tender his resignation in the United Grain Growers, wind up his business affairs in the west, and seek a seat in Parliament. The constituency of Brandon is likely to be opened by the resignation of Hon. Robert Forke, who will resign as Minister of Immigration and be summoned to the Senate, succeeding the late Hon. Robert Watson.

What other changes will occur in connection with Cabinet re-organization it is difficult to forecast at the moment, for the reason that the Prime Minister himself, does not know. A dozen different proposals are under consideration, and many factors enter into the problem. This, it is impossible for any one at the present stage to predict exactly what will happen.

As indicating some of the factors entering into the situation, it may be stated that the province of Quebec feels that some readjustment will be necessary to give the province adequate representation in the Cabinet. With the two important portfolios of Finance and Railway definitely going to the west, something hitherto unheard of, Quebec naturally feels she should have a more prominent place in the federal picture. At the present time, there are in the Cabinet the following ministers from Quebec, which sends the Government 61 supporters, or about half its following: Hon. Raoul Dandurand, Government leader in the Senate; Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice; Hon. P. J. A. Caradin, Minister of Marine and Fisheries; Hon. Lucien Cannon, Solicitor-General; and Hon. Fenand Rinfret, Secretary of State. The Justice and Marine portfolios are important, but the others are not regarded as major departments.

With the passing of Hon. James Robb, Quebec has lost the portfolio of Finance, and the English-speaking people of the province have lost their representation in the Cabinet. There are several English-speaking members from Quebec who would be willing to supply the latter deficiency, including C. B. Howard, M.P., of Sherbrooke; W. Fred Kay, M.P., of Brome-Missisquoi, and Charles Gavlin in Power, M.P., of Quebec City. It may also be pointed out here that there are more French-Canadian people in Ontario than English-speaking people in Quebec, yet they have no representative in the Cabinet from Ontario.

Status of Ontario. So far as the province of Ontario is concerned, it is understood no changes in the Cabinet representation are contemplated. The story will commence Friday.
