NEW YORK, Feb. 19—(AP)—Stocks negotiated a mild recovery in today's market, notwithstanding the continued lack of outstanding bullish news from the war.

Among Canadian stocks McIntyre Mines gained one point to 31, Doms 1-2 and International Nickel 1-4 while Hollinger lost 1-8.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 1 of a point at 36.6, first improvement this week. Dealings picked up at intervals but there were plenty of slow periods.

Transfers of 345,000 shares compared with 343,700 Wednesday. Stocks in the plus division at the finish included U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Santa Fe, N.Y. Central, Union Pacific, Great Northern, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Anacosta, Boeing, Westinghouse and Johns-Manville.

Dow Chemical and Du Pont hit new lows for the move but the former came back to finish unchanged. In arrears were Standard Oil (N.J.), Texas Co., International Harvester, Douglas Aircraft, Phelps Dodge, Union Carbide and Philip Morris.

NEW YORK, Feb. 19—(CP)—The Canadian dollar closed 1-8 of a cent lower at a discount of 11 3-8 per cent in today's final foreign exchange dealings. Ottawa's Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.06-9.91 per cent discount.

The pound sterling finished unchanged at \$4.04 in relation to the United States dollar as did other leading foreign monies.

New or Additional COST OF LIVING BONUS PROHIBITED WITHOUT PERMISSION

Order of National War Labour Board to Employers and Employees:

AN employer who was not paying his employees a cost of living bonus prior to February 15, 1942, may not start to pay such a bonus on or after that date, nor may an employer who has been paying such a bonus now increase it unless he has specific permission from a War Labour Board.

Whether in the future a bonus may be paid or changed in amount will depend on the National War Labour Board's announcement in May 1942, with respect to any change in the cost of living index between October 1941, and April 1942, unless in a particular case a War Labour Board has given specific permission to do otherwise.

LOTION ANSWER TO WINTER SKIN

Winter is a real bane of dry skins. Dry heat indoors does as much damage as cold blasts outdoors. So what's to do? First wash your face and neck with soap and water at night only. Use cream for mornings and evenings during the day. Next, apply night cream regularly. A really dry skin needs this even in summer, and when winter comes it's imperative. And that's the long and short of specific remedies. But there are other measures which will show equal important results. Repeat the upward progress ten times. Begin over again and, gradually straightening your torso, massage upward to thighs. Repeat with feet leg.

Maybe you can improve your appearance considerably by more satisfactory toilet aids. Cream rouge undoubtedly would help, if you now use powder. Select a colour that matches your cheeks after violent exercise. Apply it fairly light and be sure there are no rough edges, no white space between rouge and your ear. If blending edges is difficult, try a bit of cleansing cream on each cheek before you start patting and blending.
