ANTISEPTICS AND DISINFECTANTS

An antiseptic is any chemical substance that will prevent the growth of bacteria. A disinfectant differs from an antiseptic in that it will not only prevent the growth of bacteria, but will kill them, if applied in the proper strength. There are a large number of antiseptics and disinfectants on the market. Some are very efficient, while others are not. How to use them is not only important, but also very important. A powerful disinfectant person using it may be very much injured. It will have little or no value. The disinfectant and given a false security by thinking that, however the infection has been obtained when it is not.

In disinfecting a stable after the presence of a case of one of the infectious diseases, in order to make the work thorough, there are several fundamental principles to be kept in mind.

Fumigation is disinfection by means of a gas. If fumigation is employed, the stable must be made practically airtight for the best results. If this cannot be done, some other method should be employed. It is the most thorough method, however, when properly applied.

If liquid disinfectant such as a five per cent solution of carbolic acid is employed, care must be taken to see that every spot or part of the infected stall or stable is reached. If a spot the size of the head of a pin is left neglected, the work of disinfection may be feeble. Liquid disinfectants are best applied by means of a spray pump, so that the liquid will be forced into all the cracks and corners. In adding a disinfectant to a liquid, careful calculation should insure that the resulting mixture will contain the desired percentage of the disinfectant added.

Rev. Dr. Duncan Will Stay In Montreal

Call From Scotland Set Aside Because Canada Needs Him. Unique Meeting. Anglican Bishop Appears at Special Meeting of Presbytery

Montreal Star

For the first time in the history of the Presbytery of Montreal an Anglican bishop took part in the deliberations when at an unique meeting held Tuesday afternoon in Knox Crescent Church, Montreal, the Rev. Dr. George Duncan, pastor of the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul, was seated on the ground that Canada and the Montreal church needed him here.

The special session was held at the request of the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul without a precedent in the history of the Presbytery, for it is the first time that that body has been assembled to consider a call from a church in Scotland. Rev. Dr. Ephraim Scott, moderator, presided, while Rev. A. S. Reid, in clerk of the Presbytery, read the call from the parish of Glencairn.

The strong delegation of church officers representing the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul were then called upon to make their counter appeal to retain services of the minister. The church was in a peculiar position, the delegation which consisted of Colonel Robert Starke, J. Alex. Cameron, for the kirk session; Brig. General J. G. Ross and Gavin L. Ogilvie representing the trustees; and Principal D. J. Fraser for the congregation.




