HANDSOME MEMORIAL WINDOW.—At the morning service in St. James Church yesterday the memorial window recently installed was dedicated. The window was erected to the memory of the late Mr. Alexander McKinnon and to the honour of Mrs. McKinnon of this city by their sons and daughters. City councillor John J. City, George, Toronto, Hedley, St. John and Alexander, Sherbrooke, Q. Mrs. McNeill Boston and Mrs. Oswald Wright City. The window is a strikingly beautiful one the coloring and design being exceptionally chaste and artistic. It was built by the firm of McAusland Brothers, Toronto and installed by the Messrs Lowe Brothers of this city. In his address preparatory to dedication, Dr. Fullerton paid a glowing tribute to the late Mr. McKinnon who was for a number of years an elder and Sabbath School teacher in St. James Church and a citizen of irreproachable character, also to Mrs. McKinnon whose exemplary life in the home and in the church well merited the loving devotion which prompted this magnificent gift on the part of her children. The dedicatory inscription on the window is as follows: "Erected to the glory of God to the memory of our father, Alexander McKinnon, and to the honour of our mother, Grace Anne McKinnon, by their children."

care of many soldiers' wives and children. This was so because of the special facilities they had for so doing. They had their chain of hostels right from the base to the front line, they had them at the very front trenches where death lurked. On many occasions, a soldier passed right through the Army system of hostels and hospitals from the time he started for training until the finish. If he was wounded there were Salvation Army stretcher bearers to carry him out to the Army hospital where he would be attended by the Salvation Army laige. In conclusion Rev. KILLED IN ACTION

Mr. Samuel Barlow, Wellington, has received the following letters of sympathy:—

In the Field, (France) November 13th, 1918.

Mr. Samuel Barlow, Wellington, P. E. I., Canada.

Dear Mr. Barlow: I regret that, owing to the pressure of work created by the recent, prolonged activities of the Canadian Corps, I have been unable, until this late date, to write you a letter following up the official notification which you have, no doubt, received long ere this, that your son—3204048 Pte. W. H. Barlow, has been killed in action

He came to the Battalion on the 6th at the front in action with the enemy of Sept. and, during the strenuous fighting in which he participated, showed himself to be entirely worthy of the splendid traditions which have always characterized the Canadian Corps. His steadiness and gallantry in action are a lasting reflection of the greatest credit upon himself, his Battalion and his native land, and a memory to be cherished by all those who knew him. The battle in which he made the supreme sacrifice was one of the most important of the whole war, as the recent series of big operations, in which the Canadian Corps was so actively engaged, proved to be the final undoing of the enemy.

While advancing towards enemy positions with his Company ("D.") on the morning of the 27th September, an enemy shell landed very near him, the shrapnel from which hit him in the head and death resulted shortly afterwards.

I know that words are very futile at times like this and only wish that I could do more than simply write you. Please believe that you have my most sincere sympathy as well as that of all the officers, N. C. O's, and men of the Battalion.
