It may be assumed that some persons believed the prediction outright, while to thousands of others who heard or read it the chances of the King's coronation ever taking place seemed less probable than before. 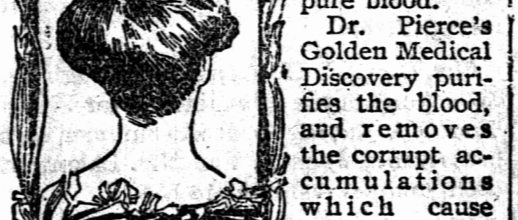
