The following is taken from an article on "Old Home Week" published in Pearson's Magazine. "In the spring of 1890 Gov. Frank W. Rollins of New Hampshire, (originator of the Old Home Week movement) issued a Fast Day Proclamation that dealt not with glittering generalities nor vague statements, but that struck straight from the shoulder, as regards matters in his State. In substance it said: 'As a race we are decadent! We have fallen away from the high ideals of our fathers, and there is no health in us. Let us get down on our knees and pray for light that we may see our way out of the darkness into which we have fallen.' At that very psychological moment the Atlantic Monthly had in press an article by Rollin Lynde Hartt, on the decadence of New England in general; and like an echo of the Governor's proclamation by the time it had filtered into the souls of New Hampshire people the proclamation began to be heard from in a vast murmur of discontent. Nothing daunted, the Governor again said substantially to his people: 'The strength of our loins hath gone out from us, and hath become the strength of other places. Let us call our sons back to us, even for a space, that by their fresh virility and new ways of thought they may give us new inspiration for our life-work that remains to us. And it may well be that, looking on our affairs with fresh eyes, solutions of our problems may occur to them which we have not seen, and they may help us with their wealth in places to which nature has not been bountiful even as reward for care and thrift. 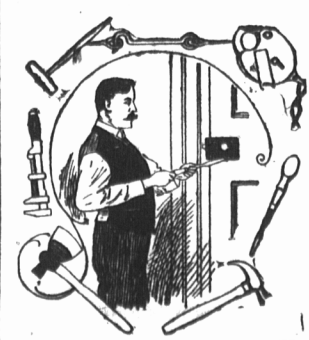
