NO CROP THIS YEAR IN FLOODED VALLEY

THE PAS, Man., Aug. 10.—(CP)—Waters of the Saskatchewan River, which flooded northern Manitoba's Carrot River Valley farming area this spring, have dropped.

The highway to the area now is above water and the Pasqua River is showing its natural banks. About 30 farmers have remained on their land. Most of these are on farms that were untouched by the flood. Two or three families have already returned, and about 150 are waiting to return. Four have taken their families out to other areas. There is no hope for a crop from the area this year. But many farmers are putting in garden produce for their own use. Dredging of Pearl Harbor as a United States naval base was completed in 1912.
