For example set up your salad-and-milk luncheon on the terrace. Fresh air, inviting sunshine and appealing table setting have a way of enhancing the attractiveness of crisp cold greens. Salads with eye-appeal are apt to have more palate-appeal. You can enhance a salad's attractions (and food value) by mixing light and dark greens; by adding sharp colour with fresh vegetables by trimming with grated hard-boiled egg, capers or chopped anchovies.
