### Motoring With Mary

Every revolution of the engine grinds out wisdom for the woman who drives a car, one of them has discovered.

#### TOO MUCH SILENCE

Too much silence in a motor car is golden—for the repair man. That is one of the recent painful lessons about motor car ownership that both Bob and myself have learned.

It started with the valves. Located just beneath a light cover plate on the engine, they are conspicuously noisy when they happen to be noisy at all. As a matter of fact, the first time I heard the noise I didn't know what it was. Neither did Bob, I believe, although he insisted otherwise.

The clicking, however, quickly became annoying to both of us and, after taking him to the office one day, I ran the car up to the service station.

"Those valves aren't very noisy," suggested the service foreman. "I can tighten them up, though, if you insist."

"Well, I insist," I remarked flippanantly.

He tightened the valves and the silence of the car mesmerized me. After that, the valves never made the slightest murmur that I did not dash up to the service station. If I didn't Bob did. As we look back over it now, neither of us denies that there must have been times when the service man was right in insisting that the valves could not stand closer adjustment, that continual adjustment for no good reason would mean a new set of valves. As a matter of fact, the new set of valves in our car bears mute testimony of his accuracy. At times the testimony is not so mute, for we learned to stand a click or two without having disciplinary action taken.

The tuition we paid for the lesson was not much but it was enough to make us remember.

We would have been rich, too, if Bob had not picked up the instrument book that came with the car one night and discovered that spring shackle bolts and wheel bearings should be tightened occasionally. Apparently, it was the only thing he ever learned about the car for every time he worked on it, he seemed to be tightening shackle bolts or wheel bearings.

"Looseness in these parts," he would say dramatically, "means wear and noise."

So, he discovered later, does tightening.

The discovery was especially painful in connection with the wheel bearings. Painful, because it was so costly.

The service station, in replacing them, explained that keeping them too tight is even worse than a slight looseness.

"Wheels," the service man told Bob, "do a lot of turning. They have a lot of power. Turn them against a bearing that is too tightly adjusted and they will grind it to pieces."

There was no arguing the point with him. He held the ground-up bearing right in his hand as he spoke. It was exactly the same in the case of the spring shackles.

To make matters more annoying and costly, it seems that while Bob was going after silences where it was not needed permitted a thump to exist in a part so long that the part finally broke. It was a spring. We both had heard the noise it made periodically, but since it always came on rough sports in the road, both of us put it down as too hard to find. It happened to be a spring bolt but it was not discovered until the spring leaves broke.

Experiences of this kind are teaching us that silence may be costly.

may result in slowing up the car unless a little gasoline is fed to the engine. Some car owners may be inclined to look upon this as waste. It is worth remembering, in such a case, that gasoline is cheaper than brake linings.

#### WATCH GAUGE DESCENT

It is at this time of the year that a raise in temperature is more or less expected to send the sensitive oil pressure gauge backward. The engine runs better and the oil thinner. There is a joker in the situation for which many motorists fall; namely, that the gauge variation is slight. If it drops back very far, it is time to check over the pump or the crankcase lubricant supply.

#### TAR REMOVAL SIMPLIFIED

Spots of tar should not be allowed to remain on the car's finish. The easy way to remove them is to soak them for a few minutes with lard or oil. When loosened in this fashion they can be removed with a cloth dampened—not wet—with gasoline.

#### CLEAN AND PAINT JACK

This is a good time to remove the rust from the jack and repaint it.

#### IDLE WIPERS WEAR OUT

Continued idleness is no better for windshield wipers than it is supposed to be for human beings. A few turns a day, however, will prevent the wiper from wearing out so quickly.

#### TAKES SPECIAL MACHINE

Many motorists has been informed that speedometer repair work is delicate enough to require a jeweler. Apparently, however, not even the average jeweler is capable of doing the work. It takes a specialist equipped with a machine devised especially to calibrate the instrument.
