—The Prince County Institute meeting held in Summerside on Tuesday last was not very well attended owing to the disagreeable weather. Those who were present, however, were treated to a fine address by Prof. Zavitz in farm work. Prof. Zavitz is recognized as the highest authority on farm culture in Canada and the only regret is that more were not able to be present to hear him. John Richards and others also addressed the meeting. Several resolutions pertaining to farm culture were passed after which the meeting adjourned. On the same evening Prof. Zavitz and Mr. Richards addressed a fairly large meeting at Malpeque.

—At the Summerside convention in Summerside, Prof. Zavitz spoke on Field Crops, particularly Alfalfa. Several who were present had been growing it with various experiences. Mr. Doyle of Bloomfield had grown it for two years and the third year it had just out. The same was true of Frank Gibson, Margate, and several others. By well directed questions Prof. Zavitz brought out that in one case the killing of Alfalfa was due to a close cropping by sheep. In the other case by severe frost in the month of May. Much information was obtained, particularly about mixed fields. Prof. Zavitz is thoroughly acquainted, on these subjects and it would pay well for all farmers within convenient distance of his meetings to attend. He speaks at Alberton, Tuesday, July 5th, Tyne Valley, July 6th, and Tracadie Cross July 7th.
