Prince County Children's Aid Monthly Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Management of the Children's Aid Society of Prince County was held in the Town Hall on Monday the 12th.

A number of cases of children not having proper parental care were discussed and one baby suffering from malnutrition and in this case money was voted for public health nurse to provide medicine and other necessities. It was reported one boy had been sent to St. Patrick's Home, Halifax, by the Judge of the Juvenile Court of the Town of Summerside.

The matter of the report of the last December meeting of the Town Council in which one of the Councilors stated that the Children's Aid Society received from the Provincial Government \$300.00 for looking after truancy was discussed. This statement was pointed out to be absolutely incorrect. The annual grant to the Society is to defray expenses of welfare work in Prince County and it is pointed out that nothing to do with the payment of truant officer's salary for the Town of Summerside. Truancy is a responsibility of the Town of Summerside and not of the Children's Aid Society. It was pointed out that truancy in the town of Summerside is still a problem.—S.

Returns from the tobacco tax amounted to \$710,967, or \$127,566 more than in 1945 and \$110,967 more than had been estimated.

On Expenditure Side

On the expenditure side of the picture, most government departments were close to their estimates. The chief exception was the Department of Public Works, which spent \$4,651,564, thus exceeding by \$1,582,002 its budget estimates of \$3,069,562, and exceeding 1945 expenditures by \$1,582,002.

The financial statement shows \$2,715,646 spent on maintenance of roads, which was \$315,046 higher than the estimate of \$2,400,600 and \$229,833 more than the \$2,429,813 outlay for road maintenance in 1945.

In addition the financial statement reveals a sum of \$617,751 for snow control, for which there was no provision in the budget. An expenditure of \$495,758 for road machinery and equipment, for which there was no provision in the budget, is also shown by the financial statement.

The Department of Lands and Mines in 1946 spent \$1,031,147, or \$282,758 more than its estimates of \$748,389. Its 1945 expenditures amounted to \$748,083.

At the close of the fiscal year the net debt of New Brunswick stood at \$88,263,659, as compared with \$84,159,633 on October 31, 1945, having increased by \$4,104,026.

Commenting on the financial statement, Provincial Secretary, Treasurer Doane said that the surplus "maintains for the McNeil administration an unbroken record in balanced budgets." He said surplus during the tenure of the present Government had reached a total of \$7,176,102, a yearly average of \$1,025,137.

Classes. To service each of the trains at least 31 railway men were used, five train crew, four conductors, one commissary car, eleven porters, and the superintendent of master mechanic who rode the train over each division. Meals served are estimated at 10,000,000. To be prepared for the 49 passenger train, from Vancouver to Halifax, almost three tons of food stuffs had to be provided to serve the fourteen scheduled meals.

Aquitania Was First

Strangely enough it was the Cunard White Star's Aquitania that lay tied to the dockside in 1939 to take the first Canadian soldiers aboard, although five ships were used for the full movement.

In addition to the nearly 1,000 servicemen the Aquitania is bringing home on this trip, she will be carrying 658 of their wives and children, 43 British Army and merchant navy personnel, and eleven members of the Canadian Red Cross. For the journeys to various sections of the Dominion of all the passengers, seven special trains will be operated out of Halifax over C.N.R. lines.

While no official explanation has been given, sales, presumably, were a good deal larger than anticipated, due to more adequate supplies of stock being available. In 1945 the operations of the N.E.L.C.B. were restricted by shortages of alcoholic beverages.

Succession duties in 1946 yielded \$1,072,414, which was \$672,414 above the estimate and \$394,929 more than in 1945. Returns from succession duties vary greatly from year to year, but average around \$500,000 to \$600,000. The death of a number of wealthy persons swelled receipts in 1946.
