NEW YORK, Nov. 18—President Roosevelt is going to ask Congress to extend the law to finance the works program until at least July 1st. The leading steel manufacturers will advance prices for finished steel products effective January 1st according to Dow Jones. According to the New York Herald Tribune 400 to 500 employees of the Bendix Mfg. Company maintained a self imposed imprisonment in the factory last night in a labor dispute. Paraffine Company declared a regular dividend of 50 cents and an extra dividend of 50 cents. American Radiator 15 cents regular and 15 cents extra. Westinghouse Air Brake \$1 special. American Seating \$2.50 dividend, 50 cents in cash and \$2 in extra or optional fraction one tenth of a share of

Existing preferred to receive one share of 5 per cent preferred as above, one share of common stock and the transferable right to subscribe to 7-10 of new common at \$12.50. Shareholders of Pacona in exchange for all their stock, 660,898 common shares. Unissued common of 169,551 shares to be applied against subscription. New 5 per cent two year bond issue for \$14,000,000 to be created and pledged with banking system.

LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, Nov. 18—Livestock market prices held steady today in early dealings with offerings on the light side. Receipts, Cattle, 42; calves, 90; sheep, 90; hogs, 401.

Cattle prices were unchanged with only a few sales. Good quality veals on the calf section made \$8.50, fair to medium good grades \$7 to \$8, grassers \$3 to \$3.50.

Good ewes and wethers brought \$7.50, lambs weighing more than 100 pounds 6.50, culls and bucks \$5.50 and sheep \$3 to \$3.50.

Bacon hogs, fed and watered, sold at \$8 with \$1 premium on selected. Butchers and heavies were \$7.50, extra heavies \$7, lights \$7 to \$7.50. Sows were unchanged at \$7 to \$5.50.

Hogs were stronger on the Maritime section, selling 25 cents higher on rail grade at \$5.50. Live grade off cars brought \$7.65. Rail grades were down 25 cents at \$7 while sows off cars made \$4.75.

Stewers sold to \$6, butcher cows \$3.25. Canners and cutters \$1 to \$2.25 and bulls \$3 down.

Grass calves made \$3, veal \$7, lambs 7.15 and sheep \$3.50.

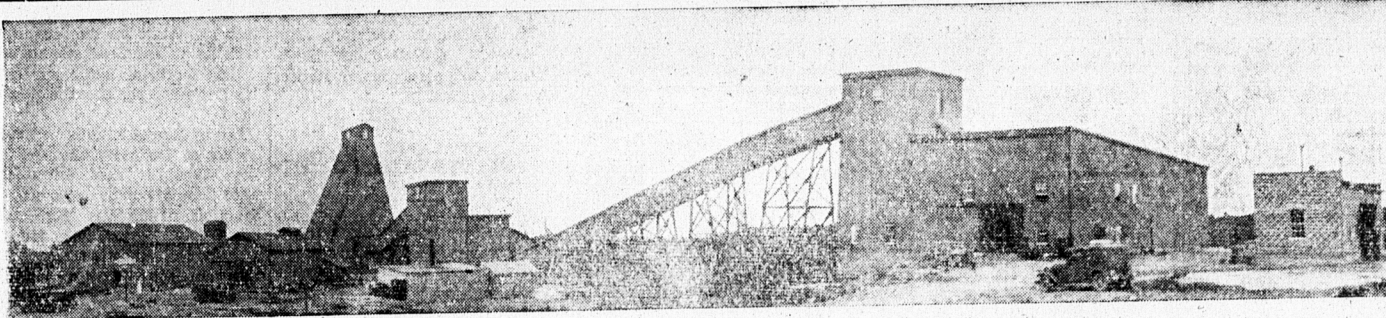

TORONTO, Nov. 18—The mining market of the Toronto exchange was rapped for substantial losses here and there and the close appeared moderately heavy today but there were narrow gains over the board.

Noranda featured the base metals by rising to a new high at 74 7-8 but all the gain was lost later. Hudson Bay registered a gain of 5-8 and Coast Copper 25 cents while Sudbury Basin lost 20 cents.

Chibougamau was thrown on the market in volume, 68,000 shares changing hands, and the price broke 33 cents to close at 2.87, just 2 cent above the day's low.

Macassa advanced 30 cents to 6.35. Buffalo-Ankerite firmed a point, Bidgood-Kirkland 13 cents, Anglo-Huronian 15.

Details of what is described as Nova Scotia's largest gold mine, and first to be equipped with a modern mill of substantial capacity have recently been released for publication. The mine is the property of Seal Harbour Gold Mines, Limited, and consists of 1,000 acres of ground stretching two miles east from the port of Colborn, 100 miles east of Halifax, and two miles southwest of the tiny fishing village of Seal Harbour.

The Seal Harbour mine was first established in a small way 35 years ago on a discovery made by a prospector, Percy J. White, who made a second discovery 25 years later that led to the present mining activities. This find, known as the Percy belt, 12 feet wide with three-quarter ounce of gold to the ton, lay dormant until 1932, when Charles Bayeroff examined it and once saw its possibilities. He optioned the property, started to mine the ore and mill it in an adjoining stamp-mill, and incorporated the

Seal Harbor Gold Mines. For eighteen months the development was financed by a private group and the gold recovered from the test-mill.

In 1934, Irving, Brennan and Co. Ltd., undertook to complete the development of the mine and to finance the construction of a modern mill. This objective was reached in September of this year, and the mine is now proving a profitable venture.

The ore deposits at present under development are five in number, namely the Percy belt, 20 feet wide, New belt (30 feet), Partington Slate belt (7 feet), Donkin belt (60 feet), Niag Hud (20 feet), and Forty belt (11 feet). It is likely that other such belts will be found as more ground is explored.

The mill is backed by a three to four years' reserve of ore, which ensures the steady and efficient operation characteristic of modern gold mines. The mine enjoys the advantage of phenomenally low production and operating costs.
