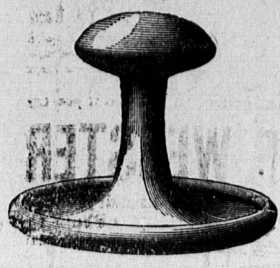

The following story which appears in a recent issue of The Western Scot, published at Omaha Neb., is modestly says "The Mac who figures in this narrative is a native of Prince Edward Island. The hard times of 1893 will long be remembered by many. It was hard to find work, and when found, the remuneration was slight. Soup kitchens were to be found in the land, and those blessed with enough and to spare bought soup tickets to give away to the less fortunate who might importune them. It was in that winter, as a Scot was sitting in his office, the door opened and a gaunt young man entered. He had no overcoat on, and his condition seemed to indicate the need of a helping hand. "Mac," the Scot mentioned, asked what he wanted and the reply was merely "Something to eat." He had been two days as much as paid for three meals and a lodging. "Mac" took the man to a restaurant, and while eating a meal, "Mac" lifted the coat out of pawn and gave it to him. He also got him a job, and the matter passed from his mind. Three days later a man brought a letter to "Mac" which said the young man was very sick, and "Mac" called. Certainly the man was very ill, and it seemed pneumonia was the trouble. "Mac" sent a doctor who said beyond doubt that was the disease, and he had not long to live. When the two were alone in the room the young man said: "You have been kind to me, and I am dying. I would like to do something for you. Please hand me that small grip. "Mac" did so, and he took out some newspaper clippings which told of three men having caused a train wreck in Texas, for sake of robbery. Two of the men had been arrested; the third was still at large and a big reward offered for his capture. "I am the third man, and you can give me up and get the reward," said the young fellow. "Mac" was very much astonished, and asked about his affairs. It seemed the young fellow was the son of a minister in Texas, was well educated, and had been led into that outrage by the two others, and was sorry for it. "Mac" was a man of that character who does not care for blood money, and instead of giving the dying fugitive up he wired to the father to come on if he wished to see his son alive. The father came, but too late; his boy had expired half a day prior to his arrival. He said that all the story his son had told was true, and he was glad "Mac" had not looked for the reward, as the publicity would have broken his mother's heart worse than now. The boy was buried and no one knew of his story until today. "Mac" is very well known in the West, and for the past 17 years has been in business in Omaha, Neb., where he told the story to a representative of "The Western Scot."
